### Legion Council Sponsors Charity Football Game; Benefit Relief Funds

Relief measures occupied the principal portion of the Legion Council meeting held in Highwood, October 16, when Leonard D. Hook of Grays Lake presided over his second district gathering.

A benefit football game was discussed with several angles to be considered. One plan was that of taking advantage of the offer made by Paul Armstrong, commander of the Cook County Legion Council, to participate in their game at Soldiers' Field and receive a percentage of the money received for tickets sold in Lake county. The other plan, which proved most popular, was that of having one of the local high schools' or Lake Forest college team devote one game's receipts for the unemployment relief. It is believed the latter plan will be the one used. The committee in charge has not yet announced full details.

Indications are that the Legion will not ask for any of the receipts to be used exclusively for relief work for ex-service men but that each post's share of the funds so raised would be turned over to the community chest of the town in which their headquarters was located. In other words, the Legion is putting its shoulder to the wheel to help the general relief situation and is not asking any particular benefit to itself.

Sergeant Wilfrid Cayer was appointed to succeed Frank Elwell as pointed as finance officer to fill the vacancy caused by Frank Elwell's resignation. Mr. Elwell has been transferred to the position of Boy Scout chairman. Other appointments announced by Commander Hook were those of Phil E. Cole, Frank Elwell, Ben Hadad, George Hosendove, and Fred Klein, as additional members of the Legionnaire committee.

Charles C. Kapschull and Harry Brown, delegates to the national convention, gave interesting reports of that highly colorful affair.

Lester Benston, state service officer the speaker of the evening, told of many interesting changes in this department of Legion work. Numerous questions from the floor were satisfactorily disposed of by Mr. Benston.

Several numbers of popular music were rendered by local talent in the Stupey-Smith post, which with the Evans-Watkins post, also of Highwood was host to the council.

Announcement was made of a get together meeting of all Legionnaires in the second division, which includes Lake county, at the new Legion home in Belvidere, on Sunday November 1st. A cafeteria dinner will be served starting at 11:30. Legionnaires in the county are urged to attend.

The next Council meeting will be held at Grays Lake on Friday, November the 20th.

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
