

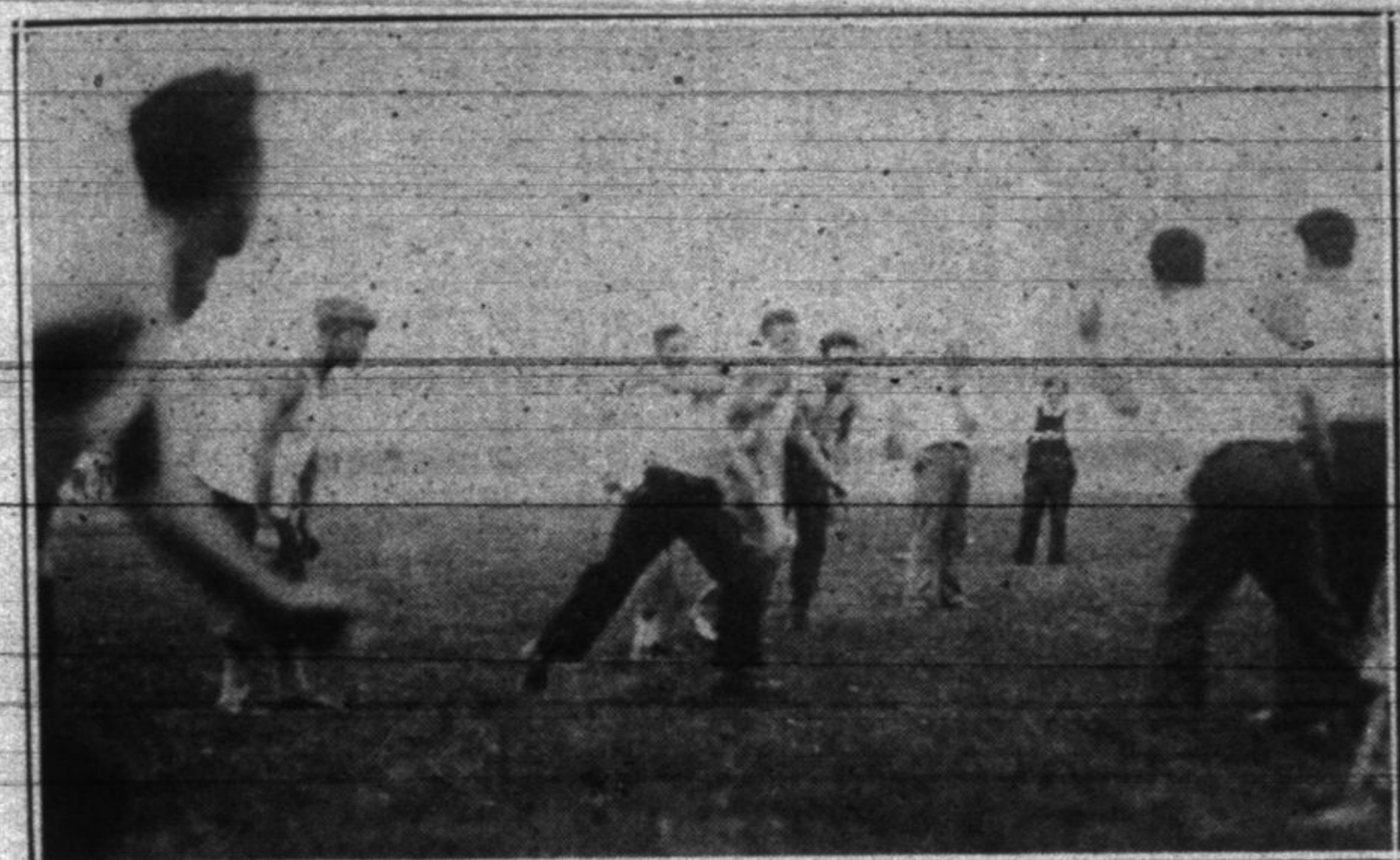

## PROVISO'S HEAVIES WIN BY 15-0 SCORE

Deerfield's heavies started out to do things in a big way at Proviso last Saturday, but the memory of the defeat by Oak Park came back like a nightmare and an expected victory became a surprising defeat by the score of 15 to 0.

### Deerfield Threatens Early

Twice in the early part of the first quarter the Bluebacks were in the scoring area only to lose the ball on downs and have Proviso kick out of danger. With the exception of one long run by Allen, Proviso held like a stone wall for the rest of the quarter.

The south goal seemed to be the most popular, and when Deerfield took possession of it in the second quarter, Proviso showed that she could threaten at that end of the field also, later making the threat good on a score by Dushek and an extra point when Rago's kick was good. Another score almost materialized when a fifteen yard penalty forced Deerfield to kick from the eight yard-line only to have the kick blocked. However, the kick was recovered by a Blueback and punted over again.

### Proviso Scores in Third

Deerfield started to come back in the third quarter, but the old fumbling hoodoo came back on the scene and the advantage was passed on to Proviso again. Pries scored for Proviso after a seventy yard run and a plunge over the goal, which was necessary because Cameron stopped him on the two-yard line.

The game was considered about over in the fourth quarter, after a slow painful exchange of the ball. Two minutes before the gun sounded the end of the game, Cristtenson was downed behind his own goal

posts, adding two more points to the opponents' top-heavy score.
