Deerfield Relief to Canvass for Funds

At the call of the president, Marshall Pottenger, committee chairman of the Deerfield Relief organization met Tuesday evening in the Citizens State Bank building where initial plans were made for a method of securing funds for the unemployed. Rev. F. G. Piepenbrok, who is in charge of the raising of money for this community drive, suggested that a house to house canvass be made by the appointment of five captains who in turn would each select a crew of five. The goal is set for \$2500, through the house to house canvass. The exact date of the drive has not been designated, but will probably be within several weeks. It is to take place on a Sunday afternoon between the hours of two and five o'clock.

Five entertainments are also to be given, with a season ticket admitting each one to the five benefit performances. Harold Vant is chairman of the entertainment committee. Tentative plans are: to hold benefit basketball and football games a band concert by the Prairie View Band, and another by the Bungalow church orchestra, and the fifth entertainment to be similar to last year's local talent vaudeville show.

Last year's efforts at relief were mainly on the surface and only a few volunteered but this year the entire community is to feel the importance and depth of the relief work by responding to the request of Rev. Piepenbrok's well appointed plan to aid Deerfield's needy families.
