### Affair Sponsored by Faculty and Students for Relief of Unemployed

To help the unemployed men of Highland Park and surrounding towns of the district more than 500 students and faculty members of Deerfield-Shields high school are busy with plans for the school's first Hallowe'en carnival. Booths, concessions, sideshows, and a water carival will offer entertainment to the crowds that are expected to fill the two gymnasiums from two until eleven o'clock, Saturday, October 31.

#### Expect 2,000 Attendance

"We are expecting 2000 people to attend the Hallowe'en carnival," Miss Elise Rinkenberger, dramatics teacher, who is in charge of all carnival plans, said yesterday, "and we hope to raise a large sum of money to be given to the unemployed men of Highland Park and the vicinity. Every member of the Deerfield-Shields faculty has some part in the carnival plans, and a variety of entertainment is offered that will appeal to young and old."

Dancing and fortune telling will be the diversions in the boys' gymnasium. Dancing will be done on the "jitney plan," to music from Le Baron's orchestra, which has donated its services for the afternoon and evening.
