National Y. W. Began This Branch of Activity in 1881; Plan Local Observance

The Girl Reserves of the nation will celebrate the fiftieth year with younger girls, November 1-8.

The national Y. W. C. A. began work with teen-age Girl Reserves in 1881, and 1931 marks the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary, the golden jubilee of the youthful "Y" members.

The span of years from 1881-1931 has seen extensive programs of growth and development in this country as well as in 46 countries of the world. The Girl Reserve program has developed to include whole some, purposable activity, the ideal of unselfish service for others, and the building of the girl mind, body and spirit.

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Leadership Training School Classes Large

Three large classes are now in session as a leadership training school for parents and church school teachers at the Highland Park Presbyterian church on Monday evenings at 7:30. The school closes on Monday, November 16.

Last Monday evening the class in sacred drama and pageantry was a busy and interested group. Gathered around a very large table they were first learning how to select plays and then they were reading aloud parts from the plays which they had selected. The group in story telling, which is also large, was having the experience of learning how to tell stories to four year old children, to six year old children, and to 10 year old children. They were also learning how to make a story longer or shorter as the time may demand and how to make a good story out of a very small incident. The group in the study of the New Testament after spending two evenings on the question of how the New Testament came into being was considering selections from the Gospels in the light of the historical background. They found that through such a process quite a different interpretation must often be given for many passages or verses.

The fourth class which had been planned, missionary education in the church school, was dropped because there was not enough demand for it.

Annual Report Of Philanthropic Com. H. P. Hospital Aux.

The Social Service Committee of the Highland Park Hospital Auxiliary wishes to report that during the past year the Auxiliary has cared for twenty-eight charity patients at a cost of \$1111.50. This amount has paid for the hospitalization of patients, for special nurses for x-rays and for the purchase of several pairs of glasses. The Auxiliary has as usual supplied milk to the undernourished children in the Highland Park and Ravinia schools. The cost of this has been \$250.29. The Auxiliary gave their annual contribution of \$300 to the dental clinic. The clinic was open from January to the end of school and there were 427 treatments given by Dr. Nichols.

Infant Feeding Clinic

The Infant Feeding Clinic continues to grow. The clinic was organized in 1925. During that year the total attendance was 95. During the past year there were 1310 examinations made, an increase over last year of 183. There were 346 babies registered during the year, 218 being new babies. Dr. McNeal is now holding two clinics a week, Monday and Thursday afternoons.

The feeding clinic from its own fund made up of contributions from the Highland Park Woman's club, the infant Welfare Society, and private contributions has supplied milk, vegetables, oranges, cod liver oil, and dextro-maltose for several babies.—Contributed.
