CITY WANTS DEPOSIT RESTRICTION LIFTED

Council to Ask Co-Operation of Other Cities Under Commission Form

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening steps were taken in the direction of an appeal to the state legislature to secure the removal of statutory restrictions on deposit of municipal funds by cities under the municipal form of government.

The city administration has been handicapped of late in the matter of depositing in local banks because the state law governing the commission form of government requires that city funds be deposited in local banks and that interest thereon must be paid at three per cent. It is pointed out that under existing conditions this is not possible, and hence abolition of the restriction is to be sought from the legislature.

Seek United Action

As about 60 cities in Illinois are under this form of government, City Clerk V. C. Musser was instructed by the council to get in touch with the administrative officials in these cities with a view to obtaining united action in an appeal to the legislature to relieve them from the difficulty.
