Caution Signs Being Placed Near Schools in Highwood Streets

Following the death in a traffic accident of a pupil of the Highwood public school, "Caution — School," signs attached to steel poles which in turn are set in portable blocks of concrete, are being set in the streets adjacent to the Highwood school and St. James parochial schools before and after school sessions.

The signs were furnished by the Chicago Motor club after George Wardle of the accident prevention department of the club conferred with Mayor Evan J. Dever, Chief of Police Emil Lauridsen and Principal Wayne Thomas of the Highwood school.

Mayor Dever gave his hearty approval to the placing of the signs and at the same time urged motorists to employ extreme caution when driving near them during periods when pupils are on the streets. Four signs of as many standards are used. Two of them are placed on Prairie avenue between High street and Pleasant avenue to guard the pupils of the Highwood school, while the two in behalf of the St. James parochial school are placed on North avenue between Railway and Funston.

With a view to preventing deaths or injuries in the future, Mr. Wardle inspected the patrols at both schools and saw to it that every patrol boy was thoroughly familiar with his duties. The Chicago Motor club, incidentally, fosters the school boys' patrol throughout its territory in Illinois and Indiana, and educators everywhere are unanimous in the opinion that this means of protection has saved countless pupils from injury or worse.

L. F. Academy Team to Play Manlius Friday on Latter's Campus

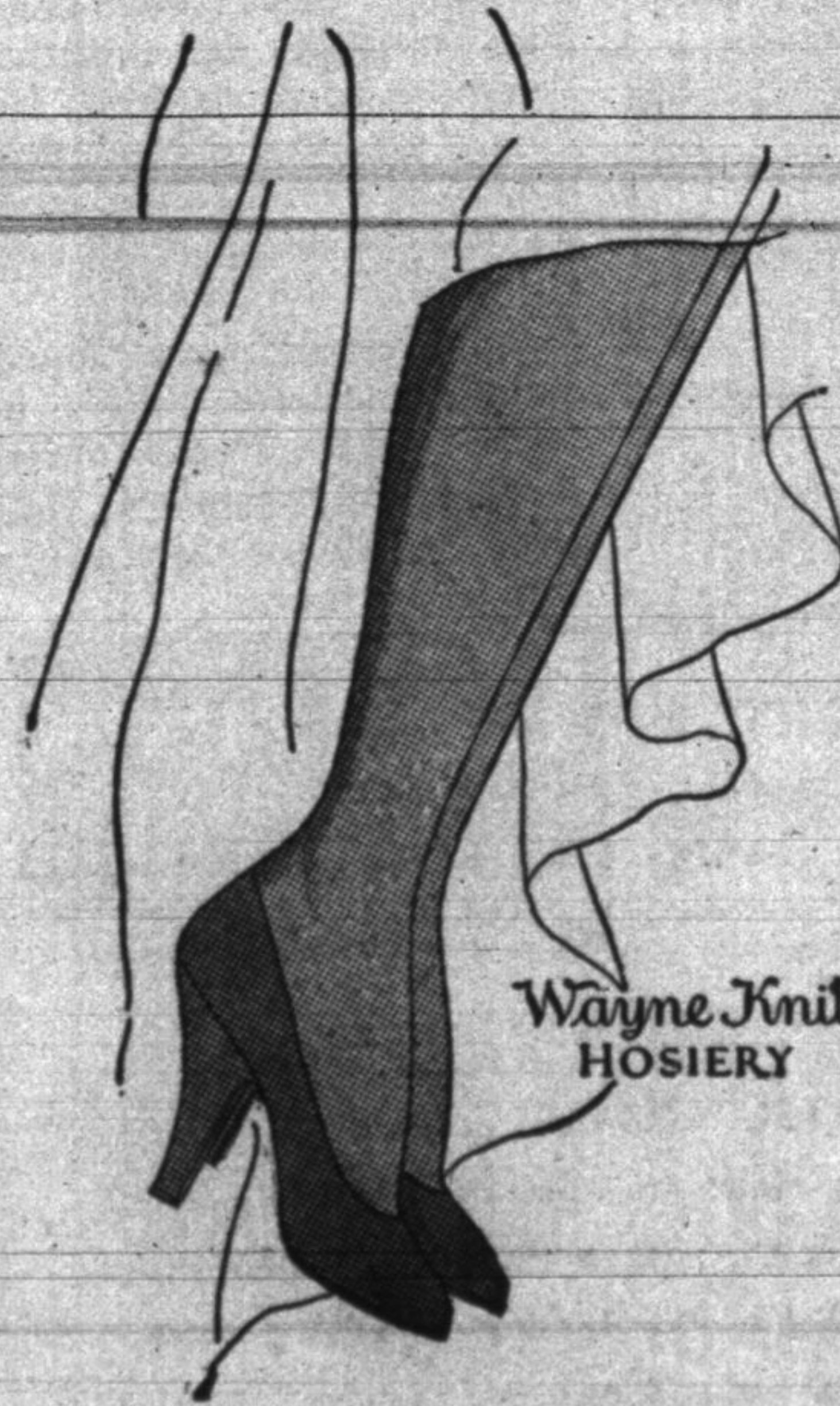
