Another victory was chalked up by the Highland Park Press All-Stars as they set back Arlington Heights 21-12, at Sunset park, last Sunday, in a rather listless game.

The Highland Park lads did not play their usual sparkling game so, consequently, their goal line was crossed for the first time. It wasn't till a touchdown had been pushed acrossed by Arlington Heights that the "All-Stars" got going in their accustomed manner. After they hit their stride it was too bad for the visitors.

Becker Scored Twice

It wasn't till the second quarter that the All-Stars could score. Several long runs by Shorty Francis and a pass from Tillie Martin to Abe Carr put the ball on the Heights eight yard line. After a couple smashes at the line, Carl Becker sliced through right tackle for touchdown to tie the score. Shorty France's drop kick for the extra was short.

A few moments later, after Highland Park had steadily pushed the visitors back to their own goal line, a safety was made as the Arlington Heights center passed the ball over the receiver's hands into the end zone to give the local lads the lead for the first time.

In the next quarter Highland Park made another touchdown. After an exchange of punts, Highland Park finally took possession of the ball in mid-field. A long pass from Martin to Gordon Kress coupled with a 15 yard penalty put the ball on the Arlington Heights six yard line from where Becker made the score on an end run. A pass from Francis to Becker was good for the extra point.

The final Press marker took place in the last quarter when, after a series of runs by Herb Bartelman and Harry Soper that put the ball on the Heights forty line, Tillie Martin, on a triple reverse, tore down the field for the score. A
