One hundred and fifty members of the Sunset Valley Golf club gathered at the annual meeting at the clubhouse in Highland Park Monday night and re-elected Edward M. Laing president, H. L. Kennicott, first vice president, and R. E. Rosenthal, second vice president.

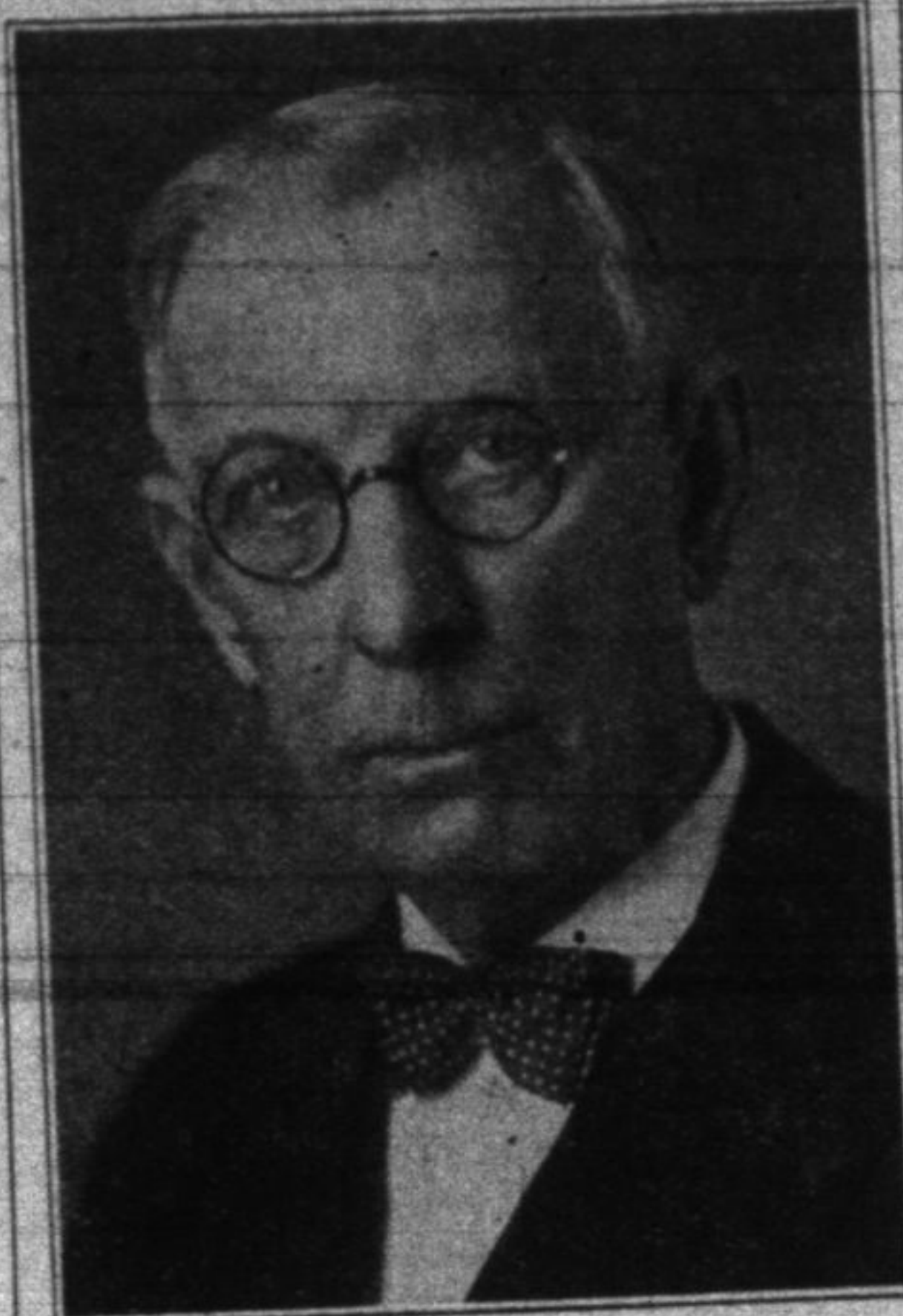

## Two Young Men and Child Injured in Auto-Cycle Crash

Melvin ("Bud") Moon and George Berube, riding a motorcycle northward on Green Bay road yesterday afternoon crashed into a Essex car driven by George Glader, Jr., as it turned into the Glader driveway, between Central and Laurel avenues. Moon and Berube and Georgia Ann Glader, three-year-old daughter of George Glader, were injured and taken to the Highland Park hospital.

Moon's condition is the most serious. He was driving the motorcycle and in the crash he suffered possible concussion of the brain when his forehead struck the car or curb in the resulting fall. He also had a broken bone in one hand, a badly battered nose and lacerations of the arms and legs. Berube was cut about the face and one eye was injured but his injuries were not considered serious. The little girl was cut about the face and hands by broken glass and Mrs. Glader, who also was in the Essex suffered cuts on the hand and was severely shaken up.

Dr. S. R. Banfield who attended Moon stated last night that X-ray pictures showed no skull fracture, but as the young man was still unconscious indication was that there was probable pressure on the brain due to concussion, and the seriousness of his condition would depend upon the amount of brain tissue damaged. The case was in no sense hopeless, in his opinion.

Moon and Berube are members of the Highland Park Press All-Stars football team and both they and the Gladers have many friends in the city who are much concerned over the condition of the injured.

The motorcycle was badly smashed in the crash and the fender and side of the auto were damaged.
