

## DR. DANIEL ROGERS FUNERAL ON MONDAY

Prominent Physician and President Board of Health for Years, Dead

Dr. Daniel Weston Rogers, prominent North Shore physician, and former president of the Board of Health of Highland Park, passed away Friday evening at the Highland Park hospital after a lingering illness. Dr. Rogers lived at 441 St. John's place, Highland Park. He had been in the hospital since February.

Daniel Weston Rogers was 65 years old, a native of Holbrook, Mass., where he was born Aug. 16, 1866, a descendant of Peregrine White, first white child born in Massachusetts. He was also a descendant of Gov. Winslow.

### Sketch of Career

Dr. Rogers was educated at Amherst and Northwestern university and had taken post-graduate work at the universities of Berlin and Vienna. He served for a time as principal of the Hopkins academy at Hadley, Mass., and as an instructor in sciences at the Harvard school in Chicago. In 1916 he served with the U. S. Army on the Mexican border with the 7th Illinois infantry. (Continued on page 42)

## Brownlow Addresses Ravinia Civic Assn.; Next Meeting Nov. 23

The first of a series of three talks on Government, sponsored by the Ravinia Civic association, was given Monday evening, Nov. 2, at the Ravinia Village House. This talk, on the subject "Public Administration," was given by Mr. Louis P. Brownlow, director of the Public Administration Clearing House, Chicago.

Mr. Brownlow has had an extensive and varied experience in public administration work. During his career he has served as city manager of Washington, D. C., Knoxville, Tenn., and Petersboro, Va. As a result of this vast experience, and a thorough knowledge of his subject, Mr. Brownlow was able to take, what to some might seem a dry subject and make it intensely interesting. He traced the Republican and Democratic forms of government from their inception in Virginia and Massachusetts down to the present day, thus accounting for many of the traditions and outgrown practices which make today's governmental practices often archaic, inefficient and unsuitable to the times.

Mr. Brownlow delivered his talk in a most scholarly manner, and his audience expressed keen delight that this series of talks on Government was off to such a propitious start.

Mr. Alfred K. Stern, chairman of the Civic association, presided, introduced the speaker, and read to the audience three very interesting letters received from former Raviniaites, commending the association on its good work and the new booklet recently published by it, entitled "Local Government."

The next meeting will be held Monday, Nov. 23; subject "County Government"; speaker, Walter F. Dodd, Chicago. The public is cordially invited to attend.
