

## OVER \$1100 CLEARED AT BENEFIT CARNIVAL

Large Crowd Participates in  
Affair at High School  
to Aid Unemployed

Over \$1100 will be distributed among the unemployed in Highland Park and the surrounding regions as a result of the Hallowe'en benefit carnival held at the Deerfield-Shields high school last Saturday afternoon and evening. A capacity crowd of over 3000 people attended the affair.

The total receipts from the carnival were \$1318. Out of this sum there was \$204 spent on lumber for the booths, decorations, and other essentials which left a net profit of \$1114 to be distributed among the needy. The entire amount will be turned over to the relief committees in the various towns who will in turn aid those who need it most during the coming winter.

Merchants in Highland Park, Highwood, Lake Forest, Deerfield, Lake Bluff, and Ravinia donated many useful articles which were used as prizes. There were ninety-two merchants and business men in

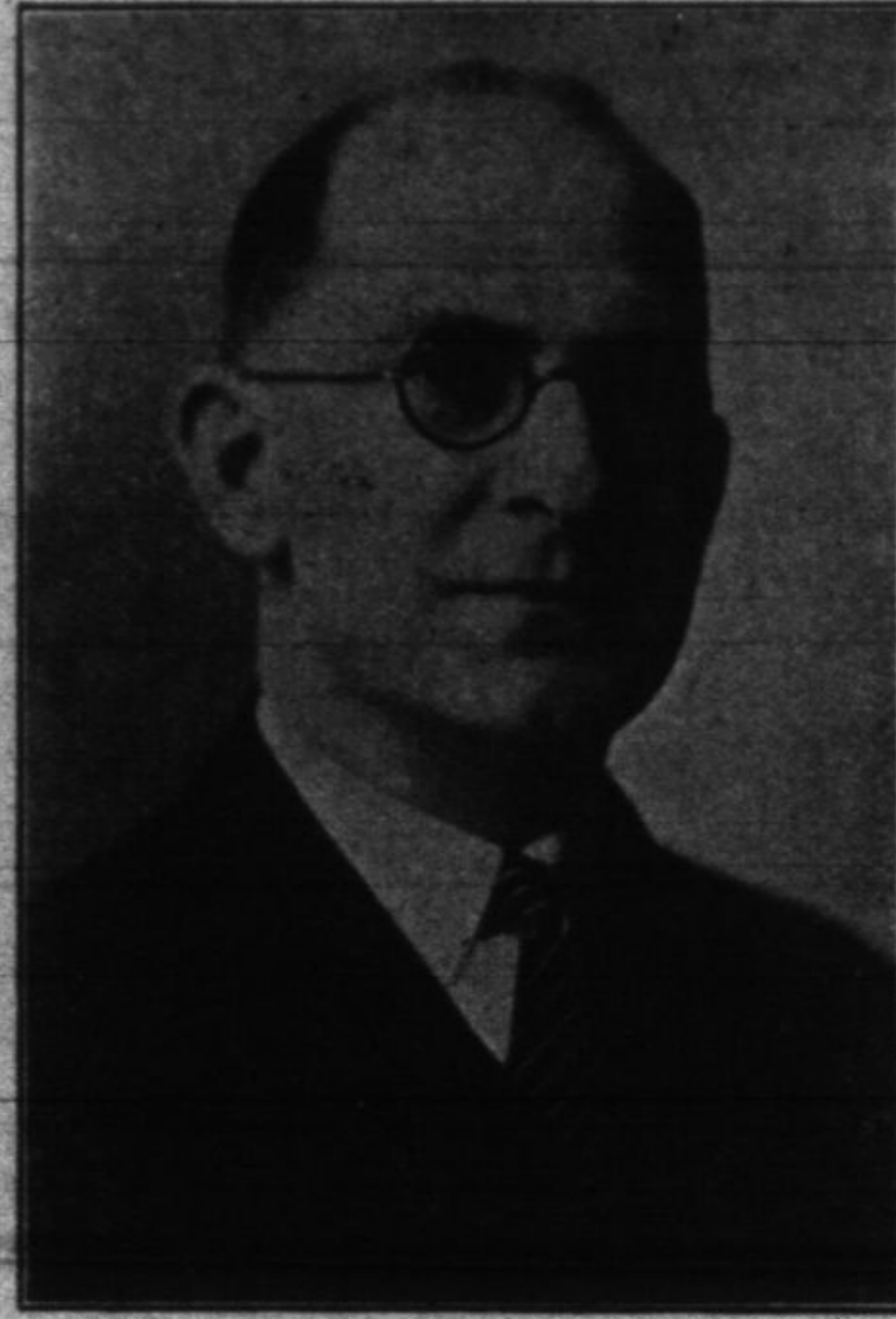

## CHARITY FOOTBALL GAME IS SUCCESS

Battle Between All-Stars and  
Flashes Last Sunday Nets  
\$600 for Relief

From 2,500 to 3,000 enthusiastic fans turned out last Sunday to see what proceeded to be one of the greatest football games in Highland Park in recent years, when the H. P. Press All-Stars and the H. P. News-Flashes clashed for sweet charity on the high school field. The News-Flashes won, 6 to 0, in a tight game, and the biggest feature of the whole affair to be reported is that the game netted \$600.37 for the Highland Park unemployment and relief fund. Officials of the social service organization had charge of the finances and report the returns as stated.

This is a neat sum to be devoted to relief work and it is to the credit of these football organizations and their supporters that this game was arranged for the purpose and so splendidly carried out for the benefit of the welfare fund.

### The Game

Paul Rubly's long legs served him nobly in the Highland Park "battle of the century" last Sunday as the touchdown he scored in the first quarter proved, enabled the News-Flashes to eke out a 6 to 0 victory over the All-Stars.

The entire proceeds being turned over to the Highland Park Social Service. Both teams were playing with clean slates neither having lost a game; the Flashes, in fact, having never been scored on.
