
#### Large Crowd Participates in Affair at High School. to Aid Unemployed

Over \$1100 will be distributed among the unemployed in Highland Park and the surrounding regions as a result of the Hallowe'en benefit carnival held at the Deerfield-Shields high school last Saturday afternoon and evening. A capacity crowd of over 3000 people attended the affair.

The total receipts from the carnival were \$1318. Out of this sum there was \$204 spent on lumber for the booths, decorations, and other essentials which left a net profit of \$1114 to be distributed among the needy. The entire amount will be turned over to the relief committees in the various towns who will in turn aid those who need it most during the coming winter.

Merchants in Highland Park, Highwood, Lake Forest, Deerfield, Lake Bluff, and Ravinia donated many useful articles which were used as prizes. There were ninetytwo merchants and business men in


