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"Against the Wind" with Mrs. Fiske, at Blackstone Theatre

The appearance of Mrs. Fiske in her new comedy by the young Chicago dramatist Carlos Drake, entitled "Against the Wind," is a dramatic event of more than mere passing comment. In the past decade Mrs. Fiske has contributed many magnificent characterizations to the archives of dramatic achievement; her mental discernment, supersensitive disposition and keen histrionic instinct has enabled her to visualize with absolute certainty, the character she creates. To enumerate these portraiture as well as tabulate the diversity of plays presented, would occupy more space than is at the disposal of this department. Suffice it to say there is no woman upon the American stage who has done more to perpetuate the spoken drama, or with more fidelity to principle, upholds the finer traditions of the stage, than Mrs. Fiske, who is now playing this season's engagement at the Blackstone theatre, Chicago, Monday night, the 26th.

In this new contribution of humorous intent and sparkling purpose, while there has not been any direct story of the comedy received, sufficient data has been secured to infer that the theme has to do with the daily activities, pastimes, romances, scandals and vagaries of an exclusive society community located on the north shore of Lake Michigan near Chicago, and that the author has taken actual personages to embroider and give life to his story; thus much hilarity, clever repartee and intimate disclosures may be expected.

As Kate Gordon, the society mentor who is the confidante, adviser and arbiter in the hundred and one differences that occur during the evening, and who is the dynamo that generates the activities to enliven the conventionalities of this community—Mrs. Fiske is said to have a character that fits her from the tips of her immaculately manicured fingers to the highly polished toes of her French shoes; a character that is so brilliantly conceived visualized with the skill of this consummate artiste.

Mrs. Fiske always has a first class company, and upon this visit, there is no exception to her established rule. Charles Dalton of magnificent stature and voice; Alice John, splendidly poised at all times; Reed Brown, Jr., well known here; Hugh Rennie, also Virginia Venable, a Chicago girl of brilliant dramatic ability, and Elsie Keane, who have been with Mrs. Fiske upon former visits; Terry Carroll, a favorite player of screen and stage; Olive Reeves-Smith, the talented daughter of a popular father; Geo. A. Lessey, another local favorite, Olivia Anders, Isham Keith and others.

FINAL RUSH TO PAY TAXES IS REPORTED

About \$80,000 Taken in County Treasurer's Office in Four Days; Sales

Close to \$80,000 in taxes were collected in four days last week, in the office of County Treasurer Jay B. Morse, who warned that general taxes and special assessments would go to sale not later than Monday of this week unless something unforeseen arose.

The payments probably exceeded the total collections for the 30 days preceding and can be accounted for, the treasurer explained, through the fact that residents did not want to have their property sold for these delinquencies.

Ordinance No Protection

Morse warned that the withdrawal ordinance approved by the Waukegan city council would be no protection to persons on their special assessments.

"Tax buyers can purchase these specials at the sale if they wish, and if they do there will be no alternative on the part of the property owner but to pay the added penalty to redeem," Morse said.

The only unpaid taxes that will go back to cities and villages, he explained, would be those that the tax buyers failed to purchase in cases where withdrawal ordinances were approved.

Sale Deferred

The sale was opened October 26, but buyers failed to appear, causing the treasurer to order the sale continued from day to day. He is almost positive that it will not be held this week but he feels certain that the unpaid taxes can be sold Monday.

Several of the professional tax buyers have been scanning the books in the treasurer's office to map out the properties they wished to buy in for tax title.
