H. L. EAST, HIGHWOOD POSTMASTER, IS DEAD

Veteran of Two Wars and Well Known Here; Funeral to Be Friday Afternoon

Herbert L. East, postmaster of Highwood and veteran of the Spanish American and World Wars, died at the Highland Park hospital on Nov. 10th. Death was due to pneumonia following an appendix operation.

Funeral services will be held at two o'clock on Friday afternoon at the residence, 40 Prairie avenue, and burial will be in the post cemetery at Fort Sheridan.

Mr. East was born in Milmine, Ill., on March 24, 1876, a son of Thomas Wheatley and Catherine (Barber) East. His father was a farmer and the late postmaster engaged in farming until he reached young manhood.

W. M. Dooley Heads Annual Red Cross Roll Call Campaign

In an appeal for memberships in the American Red Cross, whose annual roll call began November 11, the local chairman, William M. Dooley has sent out letters to prospective members explaining the nature of the call and the great work being done by this organization. The letter in part says:

Dear Friends:
Annually between Armistice Day and Thanksgiving, the American Red Cross invites every citizen to become one of its members and supporters. This year the Red Cross Roll Call has special significance. It will commemorate the fifty years of service the American Red Cross has rendered.

At no time in its history has the organization been faced with graver needs to relieve. During the past year it extended relief in more than fifty major disasters in thirty-eight different states. In one of those disasters, more than two million people in twenty-one different states received aid through the American Red Cross. The relief in the main was administered by more than 100,000 volunteer workers.

During this terrific task, and one not yet completed, the organization continued its services to nearly a half million war veterans and their families. The enrollment of nurses, public health nursing and instruction in nutrition, first aid, life saving and home hygiene continued. The volunteer services of braille, production, hospital recreation, motor corps and canteen were enlarged to meet the greater needs of the present emergency. Where no other relief agencies were present the Red Cross engaged in meeting the family needs created by unemployment.

Spectacular Fire in Skokie Monday Night

In one of the most spectacular prairie fires in many years, Monday evening over 600 acres of prairie land, west of Highland Park in the Skokie valley, were burned over threatening many small homes and a large golf club house. The fire, it is believed, was started by hunters, to clear the area for hunting pheasants and rabbits. The fire started about 6:30.

Many small backfires were started by the firemen from Highland Park, in an effort to combat the flames. The fire was confined to the prairie north of the county line road and burned rapidly. Over 3,000 persons were on hand to watch the flames, which fanned by a thirty-five mile an hour wind, leaped high into the air. The Northmoor country club escaped damage from the fire thru the vigilance of the firemen.
