

REV. A. MEIERHOFF FUNERAL TUESDAY

Last Rites for Former Resident Held at Bethany Church; Brief History

Rev. Arthur Meierhoff of Bridgeport, Nebr., formerly of Highland Park, passed away at the Scotts Bluff hospital in Nebraska at the age of 43 years, 11 months and 10 days. He was born at North Northfield, Ill., Nov. 27, 1887.

Rev. Meierhoff came to Highland Park in 1900 attending the school here and becoming very interested in church work, holding the office of president of the Young People's Christian association. Later, under the influence of Rev. Van Evera who was pastor of the Evangelical church at that time, he entered the ministry. He had several charges in Illinois in the Evangelical association and when America entered the war, Rev. Meierhoff entered the service as Y. M. C. A. chaplain at Great Lakes and served until the end of the war. Leaving the Y.M.C.A. he entered the Presbyterian association serving in Iowa and Nebraska until his death.

He was a member of the Masonic lodge at Bridgeport, Nebr., and a member of the Mystic Workers' lodge of Highland Park.

He leaves to mourn him his widow, two small daughters, Betty and Dorothy, aged 10 and 8 respectively; one sister, Agnes, of Highland Park, and four brothers, Walter of Highland Park; Reuben of Duluth, Minn.; Henry of Wilmette, and Erwin of Glenview, Ill.

Funeral services were held at Bridgeport, Nebr., Sunday afternoon where he has been serving as pastor for the last three years. Services were also held Tuesday, Nov. 10, at the home of his brother, Walter Meierhoff, of 445 Glencoe avenue, then to the Bethany Evangelical church with burial at Deerfield cemetery. Rev. Rubyfield, secretary of the Presbyterian church; Rev. Siemsen of the Bethany Evangelical church of Highland Park; Rev. Van Evera of Evangelical church of Stockton, Ill., and Rev. Divan Evangelical church of Prairie View, officiated.

Leadership School Closes Monday; to Present "St. Claudia"

A successful leadership training school will come to a close on Monday evening at the Presbyterian church. Approximately 70 scholars were enrolled in the three courses that were offered, of which number nearly 35 are finishing the courses for credit. The Highland Park school has been termed as being one of the best and strongest of its kind in the Chicago area. The story telling course, taught by Miss Lucille DesGardins, had the largest enrollment; the New Testament course, taught by Dr. E. Voight, had the next largest class; while the drama class, taught by Miss Nelle Wiley, was the smallest number, it was by no means the least in activity.

St. Claudia to Be Given

Several fine demonstrations have been presented during the worship period, of work accomplished in the classroom. On Monday evening the drama group will put on the first act of a religious drama entitled "St. Claudia," by Marshall N. Goold. The public of Highland Park is invited to attend the last session of the school, anyone not being able to be present for the class sessions is urged and invited to attend the presentation of "St. Claudia," which will take place in the auditorium of the Presbyterian Church at about 9:10 p.m., which will be the close of the school period.

Those who were enrolled in this year's school have been very enthusiastic about the work that has been accomplished. It was the unanimous opinion that another school should be conducted next year at about the same time. The following officers for next year's school were elected: Rev. H. F. Siemsen, dean; Mr. Edgar Johnson, registrar; Miss Gladys Greenlaw, chairman of administration; Dr. E. D. Fritsch, treasurer; Rev. Ray Bond, publicity; Rev. F. Piepenbrok, and Mr. H. D. Faxon. The exact time and place of next year's school will be determined on Monday evening.

Sketch of Career of Minister Called to Pulpit of the Local Church

Dr. Louis W. Sherwin, who has just been unanimously called to the pastorate of the Highland Park Presbyterian church, was born 48 years ago in Braddock, Pa. His parents died before he was 15 years of age, but through the aid of his grandparents he was able to finish his course at the local high school. Upon graduation, he obtained employment in the Pittsburgh steel mills, and was in Homestead, Pa., during the now famous "Homestead" steel strikes and riots. After working three years in the steel mills, he was enabled to return to school and graduated from Allegheny college at Meadville, Pa., in 1908.
