### Dudley Crafts Watson Popular Lecturer Opens Series Nov. 23

Dudley Crafts Watson, popular lecturer on art gave up a great honor to fulfill his contract with the North Shore Art league to deliver the first of a series of four lectures at Community House, Winnetka. He was asked to deliver the opening address, as one of the three outstanding lecturers on art in the United States, before the Institute of International lecturers at Carnegie Institute, Pittsburg on November 23.

These lecturers come from Germany, England, Italy, France, Spain and Sweden.

Instead he will display his rare gift of describing the art of Spain in a lecture entitled "The Rise and Fall of the Moor in Spain," on November 23.

Nov. 30 "The Glory of Norway."  
Dec. 7 "Venice the Pearl of the Adriatic."

Dec. 14 "Monsalvat a Real Journey to the Holy Mountain of Spain."

These lectures will take place in Matz hall, Community House, Winnetka on consecutive Monday evenings at 8 p.m.

Mr. Watson not only gives the art of painting of these countries but describes the architecture, sculpture and natural beauties of the countries. He has the entree in the studios of the most eminent artists and has access to rare places to which the ordinary tourist never goes. These lectures will be illustrated by colored slides, colored under the direction of Mr. Watson making them unusual as Mr. Watson is a painter himself.

### Acorn Handcrafters in Exhibit Nov. 17-19

There is to be an interesting exhibit in the home of Mrs. John Warmington at 378 Cedar avenue, Highland Park, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, Nov. 17, 18, and 19. The exhibit is sponsored by the Acorn Handcrafters, a small group who are using marblizing as applied decoration.

Marblizing is an old French process. A book published by George Bell in 1881 says, "marbling is the art of floating colors on a trough filled with size and transferring those colors from the surface of the size on to the paper." The present method is simpler than the old laborious one but is still done in much the same manner. It is sometimes called naturalistic painting.

Mrs. Warmington has experimented on chiffon and silk and many kinds of paper. Olga Trevisan has made some lovely specimens on hand-made Japanese tissue.

The practical application of the method will be shown by the large and varied collection of useful articles made by Jill Jones, Mrs. F. W. Menkey, Loa Renner Croke, Katherine M. Croke, and Mrs. Warmington. Blue prints of native flowers of many varieties will also be displayed.

Guest exhibitors include Anita Willetts Burnham with a collection of "around the world" trophies, also sketches and her inimitable Christmas cards. Edna May Stevenson Johanson, who is a very accomplished weaver as well as painter, will show hand-weaving, also sketches and book plates. Mrs. Monsell Davis will have a varied assortment of articles. Ann Schatz and her sister Mary G. Armstrong will exhibit hooked rugs and chair seats of their own design and make.

There is no admission fee and all who are interested are cordially invited to attend.
