

Sisterhood to Hear Armistic Talk

In observance of Armistice Day Mr. Clark M. Eichelberger, executive secretary of the League of Nations association, is to speak before the North Shore Congregation Israel Sisterhood on Monday, Novem-

ber 16, at 2:30 at the temple, Lincoln and Vernon avenues, Glencoe. Mr. Eichelberger saw service with the American expeditionary forces in France, and since the close of the war has given himself to working for better international understandings. During the past 10 years he has delivered thousands of lectures urging that the United States as-

sume what he considers its proper place in the world community. On several extended tours of Europe, during which he has attended numerous League of Nations conferences, assembly and council meetings, and sessions of the World Court at the Hague, he has made an intensive study of the League of Nations organizations. As an advocate of American membership in the League of Nations, he is actively engaged as an executive officer of the League of Nations association and is writing and speaking in promotion of the cause. He is editor of the League of Nations Chronicle, a foreign affairs newspaper published in Chicago.

Mr. Eichelberger has just returned from Europe where he attended the 12th Assembly of the League of Nations, and where he sat in on some of the Manchurian debates. He is a convincing and forceful speaker.

On the program also will be Mr. Benjamin Lendsman, baritone, af-

filiated with the Civic Opera and Ravinia Park Opera companies, who will render a group of songs.

Scout Commissioners Organize Campaign for Collection of Paper

The commissioners of the North Shore Area council met Monday night, the 9th, at a dinner meeting in Highland Park to carry out the organization and promotion of the already announced Boy-Scout-paper collection campaign. Mr. J. R. Goetz, Scout commissioner of the council, presided over the group of fifteen district and assistant district commissioners. This monthly Scout collection will be sponsored by four local publishers in the area, namely Lloyd Hollister Publishing Co., Udell Printing Co., Glenview View, and the Independent Register of Libertyville. The paper collected will be shipped and trucked to a Chicago paper mill and the proceeds will go 100 per cent to the local relief organization. It is estimated the campaign throughout the council will net about \$1,000.00 a month. A preliminary canvas to every home will be made Saturday, Nov. 21, by the Scouts to solicit the co-operation of everyone by their pledge to save their papers and magazines for the scout collection to be made on the second Saturday of every month, starting Saturday, Dec. 12. The plan of organization and promotion as developed is that the commissioners will make personal contact with all the troops in his district and help the scoutmaster plan the organization of his boys to cover the section of town assigned the troop. The details of the campaign has been checked with paper manufacturers, paper warehouses, the executive board of the council, publishers, scout leaders and all agree that it is a most feasible and worthwhile project.

Sees Prosperity For Middle West After Depression

The middle west is destined for a greater industrial prosperity as soon as conditions become stabilized, according to John H. Morris, industrial agent of the Illinois Central railroad. The majority of manufacturing plants are faulty in their location, Mr. Morris contends, and the only way to overcome this situation will be to establish new units close to the centers of population, distribution and manufacture, all of which are in the "Greater Chicago" area.

Already inquiries are pouring into the industrial offices of the Illinois Central as to favorable locations for plant units and have been for the last sixty days, Mr. Morris says. Improving conditions in South America, particularly in Argentine, lead him to believe that the middle west is in a strategic position in the way of future tonnage volume. Heavy movement of agricultural implements from the Chicago area to Argentine is looked for.
