Laing, for more than 35 years a leader in civic progress in Highland Park were held at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning in the clubhouse of the Sunset Valley Golf club of which he was president. Members of the Highland Park East Park board were honorary pallbearers. Mr. Laing was superintendent of the park district.

The service was conducted by the Rev. Frank Fitt, former minister of the Highland Park Presbyterian church, who came from Grosse Point, Mich., to officiate at the obsequies of his old friend. 
