

## GAMES AND STUNTS FOR THANKSGIVING

After-Dinner Amusements Suggested by Community Service of H. P.

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## H. P. HEALTH BOARD

At this time of the year the doctors expect an increase in the number of cases of whooping cough and only by great care on the mother and teacher can an epidemic be prevented.

Whooping cough is not a mild disease. Coming at this time of the year, pneumonia is a more common complication and the cough may persist throughout the winter. The outdoors treatment is very important but cannot be carried out as safely in the winter as at other times of the year.

It is especially desirable to prevent the disease in the very young. Statistics show that it is much more severe under the age of three years than during latter years. Many children escape infection only to suffer from the disease in adult life and pass it on to their children.

Whooping cough spreads rapidly in a community because it is most highly contagious in the early stages when it is difficult to distinguish from an ordinary cold. The characteristic whoop, hard spasmodic cough and vomiting does not appear until the disease has progressed for about ten days, during which time it can be passed on to other children. Therefore a child suffering from a cold should be kept home for at least two days. If a cough develops further, isolation should be carried out. The patient should not be returned to school until the cough is definitely better or until a consultation with a doctor demonstrates the innocence of the persistent cough.
