EXPECT LAW SUIT AGAINST NON-HIGH SCHOOL BOARD TO BE HEARD SOON

Members of the Deerfield-Shields high school Board of Education expect their suit against the non-high school board of education to come into court within thirty days.

The suit was brought for collection of unpaid funds due our board on unpaid tuition of non-high school students for the last few years. These non-high school district students come from the outlying towns of Lake Bluff, North Chicago, Half

Day and Prairie View.

In the past the Deerfield-Shields board has billed the non-high school district on the basis of what was paid by those living within the district. This included the cost of maintenance of the school and such other items.

The board of the non-high school district for years has paid only a portion of the bill given to them, claiming that the high school would have to be maintained whether their students attended school or not, and that therefore they should not be charged tuition for such items.

Richard F. Locke of Glen Ellyn is the attorney handling the case for the Deerfield-Shields board.

INSTRUCTOR INVITED TO ATTEND BETTER HOMES CONFERENCE

TO MEET AT WHITE HOUSE

Invitation Received From U. S.
President by Mr.
Durbahn

An invitation has been received by Mr. Durbahn, vocational instructor at Deerfield-Shields high school, from President Hoover asking him to attend a conference on the subject of "Home Building and Home Ownership" to be held at the White House December 1-5.

The conference is being called as the result of President Hoover's consultations with his Secretary of the Interior, Robert P. Lamont, on a plan for promoting interest in the building of homes costing less than \$10,000. As there are many more people in moderate circumstances than in other walks of life, it is fitting that there should be some plan whereby these people can have good, substantial homes at a moderate price. When people own their own homes in a community they take much more interest in the affairs of that community than if they are just renting.

Mr. Durbahn was asked to attend this conference because of the honor and prestige gained by the high school in winning first prize in the National Better Homes Contest of America in the Boy Built House Class.

The school received a prize of seventy-five dollars for winning first place, but as Mr. Durbahn says, "It is not the money which counts, but the honor gained in winning the first place."

Other Departments Help

But it was not the vocational department alone that made this project what it turned out to be, Mr. Durbahn points out. A good part of the work was shared by other departments of the school. The art department and the home economics department lent their help in decorating, furnishing and landscaping the premises.

The thing that was really considered so great about our boy-built house was that a small house was built with a maximum amount of room at a minimum cost.

Waukegan Residents Are Granted Patents

Two patents were issued last week to Waldemar L. Lindgren of Waukegan for dish washing machines. He was allowed a total of 19 claims to new ideas in connection with both inventions. One of his applications was filed Aug. 14, 1928, the other July 19, 1929. Neither of the patents has been assigned for manufacture.

Another Waukegan inventor was Andrew K. Barr, who invented a hoze nozzle and filed his application Feb. 16, 1929. Two claims were allowed.

Waukegan due to many mechanical plants compares well with any city of its size in the nation for the number of patents issued annually to citizens.
