Their work for the summer has just been completed and the exhibit promises to be an unusually attractive one this season.

Friday and Saturday the exhibit will be open from 2 to 5 o'clock, and Sunday from 2 to 7 o'clock. Tea will be served Sunday by the Arts committee. Mrs. Robert Grinwell, president of the Ravinia Woman's club and Mrs. M. A. Kettner, chairman of the Arts committee will act as official hostesses on Sunday. Tea will be poured by Mrs. W. A. Mast and Mrs. A. F. Durand. There will be no admission charge and the public is extended a cordial invitation.

New Plan Started By Social Service Group; Aid to Women Workers

A new plan is being started next Monday, Nov. 30 at the Highland Park Social Service headquarters where women will be able to sew and receive pay. Five or six women will be allowed to work no longer than six hours each day. Women with children who cannot go out all day to work will be able to work several hours.

"This project is being financed by Mrs. S. L. Reinhardt Jr., a resident of Highland Park, who is taking the money she would otherwise have spent on Christmas gifts for her friends, and buying the material and paying the workers with it," says Mrs. T. L. Osborne, vice chairman of the Social Service committee. A room on the second floor of the headquarters will be given for this purpose, and an unemployed woman will be put in charge. Lunches will be served to the women working here.

Children's garments, coats, and dresses will be made and the women will be able to pay a small sum and purchase the garment or receive pay by the hour. An unemployed girl will be hired to take care of the children who are brought with their mothers.

"Much has been said of the first floor but little said about the second floor of the Social Service headquarters," said Mrs. Osborne. "The large front room on the second floor will be a reading room for the unemployed men waiting for jobs. It is sponsored by the Men's Fellowship club of the Highland Park Presbyterian church. The room will be comfortably furnished with tables and chairs, a phonograph, a davenport, and a radio will also be put in the room."

The furnishings have all been donated for service in the Social Service department.
