Bids will be received by the Deerfield-Shields High School Board of Education up to 8 p.m., FRIDAY, DECEMBER FOURTH, (December 4, 1931), for the construction of a Field House at the Athletic Field, West Park Avenue, Highland Park, Illinois.

Bids may be deposited at the Deerfield-Shields High School at that time, or, at the office of the Architects up to 4 p.m. the same day.

Separate bids are requested in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by Perkins, Chatten & Hammond, Architects, 160 North La Salle Street, Chicago, Illinois.

Separate bids are desired on each trade as indicated by the specifications.

Bidders will show alternate bids upon blanks furnished by the Architects.

All bids will be accompanied by certified checks in favor of the Board of Education for 5% of the amount of the bid. Said checks to be cashed by the Board in case the Contractor fails to sign a contract in accordance with his bid.

Plans and specifications shall be obtained at the office of the Architects and a deposit of \$20.00 shall be made subject to return upon the returning of the plans and specifications.

No proposal will be considered unless the party submitting it shall furnish evidence satisfactory to the Board of Education that he has the necessary facilities and sufficient pecuniary resources to fulfill the conditions of the contract.

Highwood Scouts in Newspaper Drive For Relief Fund Benefit

The Scouts of the Highwood district of the North Shore Area council turned out unanimously for the drive for the needy which started Saturday 21. The Scouts of the three troops in the district certainly showed their spirit that they will most urgently cooperate with the council in making this drive a huge success. The Highwood district troops are Troops 36, 37 and 67 of Fort Sheridan. The Scouts assembled Saturday morning in their pre-arranged territory before starting the drive. The drive lasted about two hours in which time about 185 pledges were secured. Following are the reports of the different troops as furnished by Ambrose Cantagallo, district Scout reporter.

Troop 36 of St. James school started the drive with 12 Scouts, each Scout averaging about seven pledges. Their total number of pledges was about 80. The boundaries taken by Troop 36 were north of Highwood avenue to Ashland avenue on the west side of the rail road and Washington to North avenue on the east side of the rail road in Highwood. They also covered some Highland Park territory. The leaders were Richard McNeil, patrol leader and Ambrose Cantagallo, junior assistant scoutmaster.

Troop 37 of Oak Terrace school started the drive with ten Scouts, each Scout averaging about five pledges. The total number of pledges taken in by the troop were about 50.

The boundaries of Troop 37's territory was south of Highwood avenue to the Exmoor club and to Chicago avenue in Highland Park on the west side of the rail road, while on the east side they had from North avenue, south to Moraine road. The Scouts of Troop 37 also covered some territory in the north side of Highland Park. The leader was Jacob Jeppesen, junior assistant scoutmaster.

Troop 67 of Fort Sheridan started the drive with nine Scouts, each Scout averaging about six pledges. Their total number being about 55 pledges. The Scouts of this troop covered all of Fort Sheridan. They were led by Lieut. Scott, their Scoutmaster.
