ROSENWALD FUND SPENDS HUGE SUM

More Than \$2,500,000 Utilized This Year, Report Says; How Used

Expenditures of more than \$2,500-000 have been made by the Julius Rosenwald fund, founded through the generosity of the distinguished Highland Park resident, during the present year, it was disclosed in a report issued by Edwin R. Embree, president of the fund, last week, according to Chicago newspapers.

Much of the fund was spent in development of the health and education of the negro in the south, although the work also covered development of medical economies and in generally.
