the Board of Election Commissioners, who went over the material on Elections and Party Committees. Dr. R. A. Hatton of Northwestern university has read the section on City Government and has made some valuable suggestions for the chapter on elections. DeWitt Billman of the Legislative Reference Bureau has served as the final line of authority for the information giver on State Government.

The material in the special appendix devoted to a discussion of Cook county, as well as the chapter on county government, has been checked by J. L. Jacobs, Cook county's efficiency expert. Eugene Holland of the State Treasurer's office assisted in verifying the material of the chapter on Public Finance.

Pertinent Articles

The November issue of the Illinois Voter contains two pertinent articles: "What is wrong with our tax system," by Mary L. Langworthy, former president of the Woman's City club of Chicago, and "The Dark Continent" by Prof. Charles M. Kneier, of the Department of Political Science of the University of Illinois. The Voter makes this editorial comment on the subject of Prof. Kneier's article:

"The county has been referred to as the dark continent of American politics. The increased attention which it is receiving at the present time from state legislatures, interested citizens, and students of government indicates that it is to be no longer the great neglected field of American government. Important reforms and significant changes will unquestionably take place in this field within the next ten year period.
