The new departure, that of showing two feature films on one program, is going to have many champions, but at the same time there are disadvantages. Time was when an entire program could be endorsed, but it is humanly impossible

to get a combination of films that can be consistently accepted and equally recommended and endorsed. Parents will find it increasingly hard to discriminate, and to decide about their children's entertainment, and when we are prone to criticize the interpolation of something not up to our standard, let us bear in mind the difficulties that beset the manager. Take the program next Saturday for example. "Skyline" offers pretty fair entertainment in the story of a forlorn boy plucked from the river docks and on the same program, we have "The Dreyfus Case," a very outstanding film with an English cast, excellent, strong, dignified, but beyond the appreciation of the very young. However we have the second installment of the serial "Battling with Buffalo Bill" and so there is an effort at a balanced program evidenced. "Riders of the Purple Sage" by Zane Grey is a well-directed western with excellent photography, beautiful scenery, fine horsemanship, a family picture.

"Spirit of Notre Dame," a fine football story, well acted, the romance is trivial and mediocre but it is a picture all may see and youths will enjoy especially.

"Get Rich Quick Wallingford," this vivid, humorous, quickwitted cast provide plenty of thrills and comic situations. William Haines is especially good and it is a rollicking entertainment for the entire family to enjoy.

"Smart Woman," Mary Astor, the late Robert Ames, and a good cast create many tense but amusing situations in this drama of domestic relations. Adults and juniors will find this well worth seeing. Are we not to be congratulated to find so many satisfactory attractions booked in the week to come? Remember this when you are not so well pleased, and be tolerant.
