Talks On Marvels

Sergius P. Grace, vice president of the Bell Telephone research laboratories, will describe the marvels of modern science in a lecture-demonstration, sponsored by the North Shore Chambers of Commerce at 8 o'clock Thursday evening, Dec. 17, at the New Trier township high school, Winnetka.

A special committee, headed by Mr. Loren P. Meyer, chairman, assisted by B. P. Clark, B. E. Tberle, E. A. Belmont, G. R. Galloway, D. C. Moody and A. F. Ruttinger, has been named as sponsors for this meeting.

"Play-o-fine Crink-o-hope" is the cryptic title of one feature of the demonstration on the present and future marvels of sound transmission to be given by Mr. Grace. Other items include the Artificial Larynx, the Thundering Heart Beat, Creeping Speech, Hearing a Picture, the Electric-Stethoscope, the Dial that Speaks, and other recent developments of scientific research.

The chambers of commerce have issued invitations to members of the various civic clubs and other civic bodies. Admission to the lecture-demonstration will be by ticket only.

On account of the limited seating capacity for this meeting, Mr. Meyer urges those who plan to attend to send in their acceptances as early as possible.

Says Apple Sales Are Larger This Season
