**Mayor Appoints Group to Have
Charge of Washington
Celebration in 1932**

In keeping with the action of congress in connection with the celebration of the George Washington bicentennial in 1932, the United States Commission is actively urging the appointment of Bicentennial commissions in each state and territory and of committees for the same purpose in the cities and towns of the country.

In co-operation with this plan, Mayor E. B. Metzger of Highland Park has appointed the following members of the Highland Park Bicentennial committee:

This commission is asking the aid and cooperation of all the organizations, clubs, schools, churches and citizens of the town to plan for a "George Washington Year" in 1932. The commission is ready with literature, posters, and suggestions for programs for every organization desiring to put on a program.

All over the United States and in many other parts of the world the two hundredth anniversary of the birth of George Washington will be celebrated during more than nine months of 1932, next year.

By the authority of the United States Government and organized under the auspices of the George Washington Bicentennial Commission, of which President Hoover is chairman, the celebration will not be confined to any one locality, nor to a few localities. It will be universal.

Every state, city, and town, every organization and institution, every home and individual in the Nation is expected to participate, together with Americans and others in many foreign countries.

Each community is expected to arrange its own program and carry out its own series of celebrations with the cooperation and assistance of the United States Commission and State Bicentennial Commissions.

Starts Feb. 22, 1932

The great series of events will open on Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, 1932, and continue through Thanksgiving day, Nov. 24, 1932, with special national and local celebrations everywhere on all holidays, anniversaries, and other days that can be connected with the life of George Washington.

The George Washington Bicentennial Commission was created by a joint resolution of Congress, approved Dec. 2, 1924, to study and recommend a proper celebration in 1932 of the Two Hundredth anniversary of the birth of George Washington. As planned, the celebration is to be in exact keeping with the motive expressed by Congress "that future generations of American citizens may live according to the example and precepts of his exalted life and character and thus perpetuate the American Republic."

Paul L. Udell of Highland Park has received from Governor Louis L. Emmerson official notification of his appointment by the governor as a member of the State Planning Commission, authorized by the 57th General Assembly. Representative men from all sections of the state are included in the membership of the commission, which will submit to the next general assembly "A comprehensive plan for the protection, preservation and development of the state's resources which will be helpful to agriculture, labor, mining, manufacturing, industry, highways, aviation, waterways, railways, water supply, stream control, parks and parkways, forestry, farm preserves and other resources of the state."

J. Paul Clayton, Springfield, president of the Illinois Chamber of Commerce, is named chairman of the organization of 20 men who are to serve without compensation or expense.

**Rev. Fr. McDonough
Transferred to Chicago**

Rev. C. L. McDonough, pastor of the Holy Cross church of Deerfield has been appointed to the Precious Blood parish in Chicago and will leave Deerfield on Saturday to take up his duties in his new church the following day. Announcement of his resignation came as a decided shock to his parishioners on Sunday. Father McDonough came to Deerfield two years ago in June. For ten years previous to that time he had served as assistant priest at St. Jerome's church in Rogers Park and Our Lady of Solace on the south side of Chicago. The Precious Blood church has a congregation of 3,000 and Rev. McDonough will have three assistants for the seven masses each Sunday. There are about 500 chil-

dren in attendance at the church. Rev. McDonough has devoted a great deal of time to the young people and children of his parish, who keenly regret his departure, also.

The new priest will be Rev. Father Savage of Wadsworth.
