Today, December 3 Is Illinois Day

Today, Dec. 3, is Illinois day. How many of us would recognize the official Illinois State Flag if we should see it flying today? It carries the emblem of the state seal on a white ground.

Credit for long-continued efforts toward selection of the design should be given to the late Mrs. Ella Parke Laurence of Galesburg. In 1912 she offered a prize to Illinois chapters of Daughters of the American Revolution for the best design for a state flag. Out of 35 drawings submitted, the one from Rockford, Ill., was selected as best by the following four judges: Lewis G. Stevenson, Secretary of State; Francis G. Blair, State Superintendent of Public Instruction; C. C. Craig, Justice of the Supreme Court of Illinois; and Hugh S. Magill of the State Art commission.

The bill provided that the reproduction of the emblem "be authorized and permitted when introduced in black or in the national colors upon a white sheet or background for use as a state banner or insignia" was passed by the 49th General Assembly and became a law in July, 1915.

High School Library Seating Plan Unique

The library of the Deerfield-Shields high school is one of very few in the United States that have its special seating arrangement.

R. L. Sandwick, principal of Deerfield-Shields, got the idea for this from the reading room in the public library at Newark, New Jersey. Ordinarily a library has tables where students are seated in groups of six or more.

"The pupils are more likely to be lax in their studies when a library employs this arrangement," said Miss Dorothy Teare, librarian at the high school. "Our individual seating arrangement allows greater concentration by the students."

The students are placed in 12 parallel rows of seats. A partition separates every two rows so that there are sections of two rows of seats with an aisle between.

Mrs. John Stryker Injured Sunday Eve

Mrs. John Stryker was knocked down by an automobile driven by two Evanston girls, on Sunday evening about five o'clock on Waukegan road, at the Orchard lane crossing. She was unconscious for several hours and her injuries are considered very serious.

COVENANT CHOIR AT H. P. BETHANY CHURCH

Famous Musical Organization at Vespers Next Sunday; Also Three Soloists

Those who love sacred music will have a real treat in store next Sunday afternoon, Dec. 6, at which time the Swedish Covenant Choir of Chicago will present one of their sacred concerts at the Bethany Evangelical church at a 3:30 vesper. This musical organization was formed about seven years ago through a selective process from the various Swedish choirs in and about Chicago. The chorus consists of about 40 voices that are well balanced and blended for choral purposes.

Well Known

This group is well known throughout the Chicago area due to the fine work that they have done in the past. Their annual concerts in Orchestra hall always draw a great throng of people. Their services are in constant demand, singing in many churches in the Chicago and suburban area. For a number of years this organization has taken tours throughout various states outlining an itinerary of two to four weeks. This past summer they met appointments in the states of Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska and Illinois. Several years ago they received an invitation to come to Sweden, while there they made a tour of Sweden and Norway giving their concerts in a number of the principal cities.

The choir will be accompanied by three soloists on the coming Sunday, Mrs. Ruth Svedberg, soprano; Mrs. H. Cullberg, alto; and Mr. Oscar Green, baritone. In addition to the regular numbers on the program the choir will sing two numbers in Norwegian and two numbers in the Swedish language.

Mr. David Olson of Highwood, who is a member of this organization, was instrumental to a large extent in bringing this fine treat to our community. Through his personal efforts the chorus has offered to present this concert "Gratis," for the benefit of the "Building fund campaign" of the Bethany church, which has been in progress for several months and will close with the month of December.
