North Shore Area Council, Boy Scouts Of America Celebrates Fifth Anniversary

Out Church Fire
The result of a violent electrical storm, the Old South Church of Haverhill, Mass., was struck by lightning and set on fire. A large number of Boy Scouts gathered and extinguished the blaze.

Save at Aviation Meet
The recent New Jersey Championship sponsored by several American Airlines at Hadley Airport, New Brunswick, N. J., was a success. Boy Scouts of Troops No. 1 of New Market and No. 1 of New Jersey, patrolled the crowds from herding in the air. Scouts signallers maintained communication system between the airplane main hanger and the official center of the field.

Work Site of Old Fort
The wind and rain have been wearing down the sod walls, once 10 feet high, at the site of Fort Judson, 12 miles from Mankato, Minn. The fort was built as a protection against the Indians. Recently only ridges of dirt remain at the location of the old stronghold. Through the efforts of Boy Scouts of Judson, the spot is marked with a plate set in a concrete base.

ADDRESS SCOUTERS
Mayor Anton J. Cermak, Mayor of Chicago, will be the principle speaker at the assembly of nearly a thousand Boy Scout leaders from the states of Illinois, Wisconsin, and Michigan. This is the first assembly of the National Scout Council since 1927. The assembly will be held at the Water Beach hotel on Wednesday, December 2, 1931. Mayor Cermak has shown a keen interest in the scouting program. In spite of his busy schedule on his time he has enthusiastically accepted this opportunity to speak before this assembly of Scout leaders.

The North Shore Area council men met at this assembly last year and a delegation is anticipated for this year. The theme of the conference is "The Green Light—Let's Go." The assembly will be held at the home of the prominent Scout men as the speaker, Deputy Chief Scout Executive A. Schuch, National Director of operations. Sir Arthur Branford, England, and Walter Kippen, Scout executive will participate in the program. Dr. Wm. H. Miller, pastor of the 1st Presbyterian church of Chicago, will address the assembly at 11 o'clock on "The True Resources of Our Youth." Mr. Philip L. Lugo, Region 7 chairman, will master for the evening banquet.

The assembly will begin at 11 o'clock in the morning and last through the afternoon program, starting at 6:30.

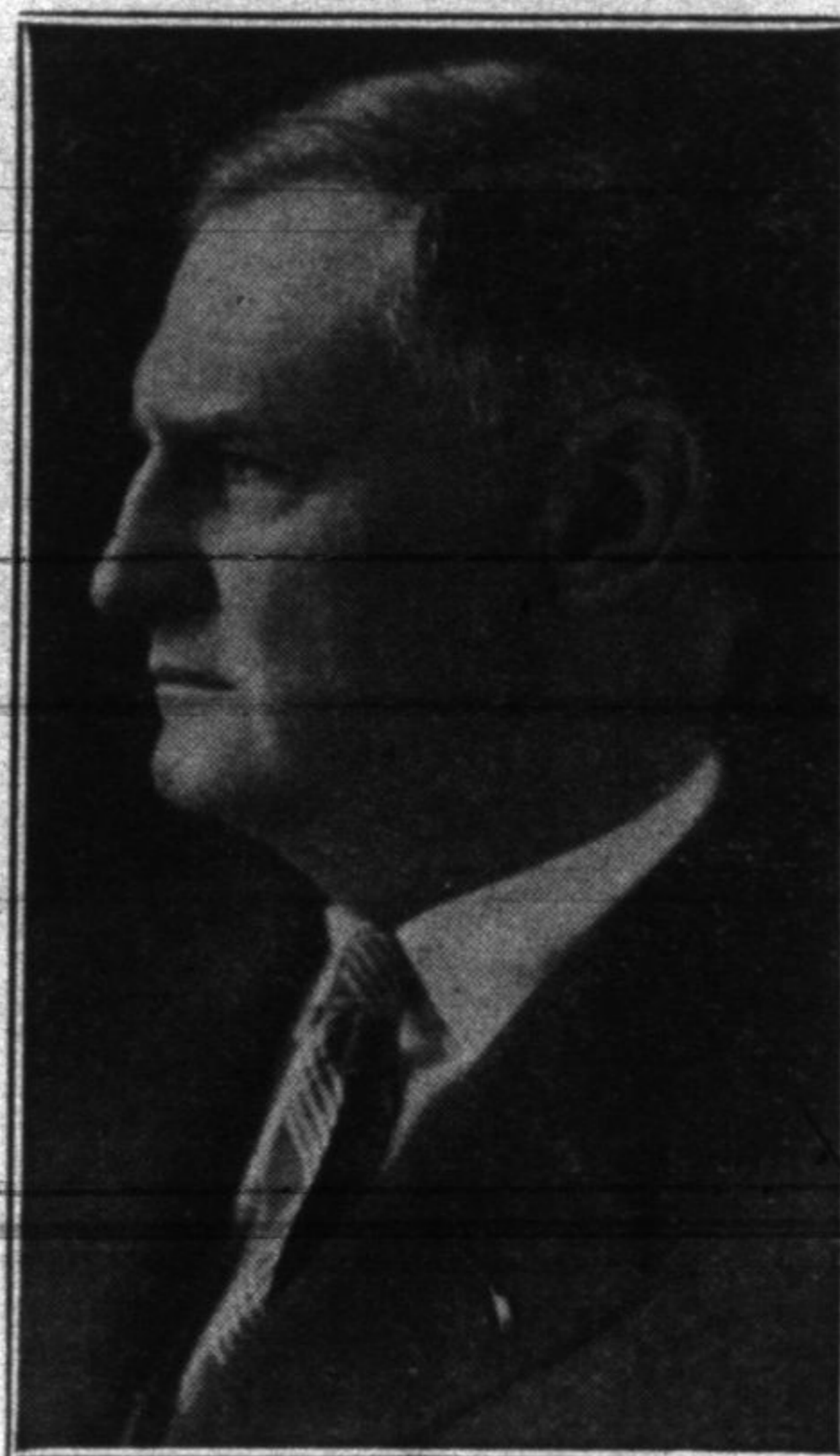
HELP

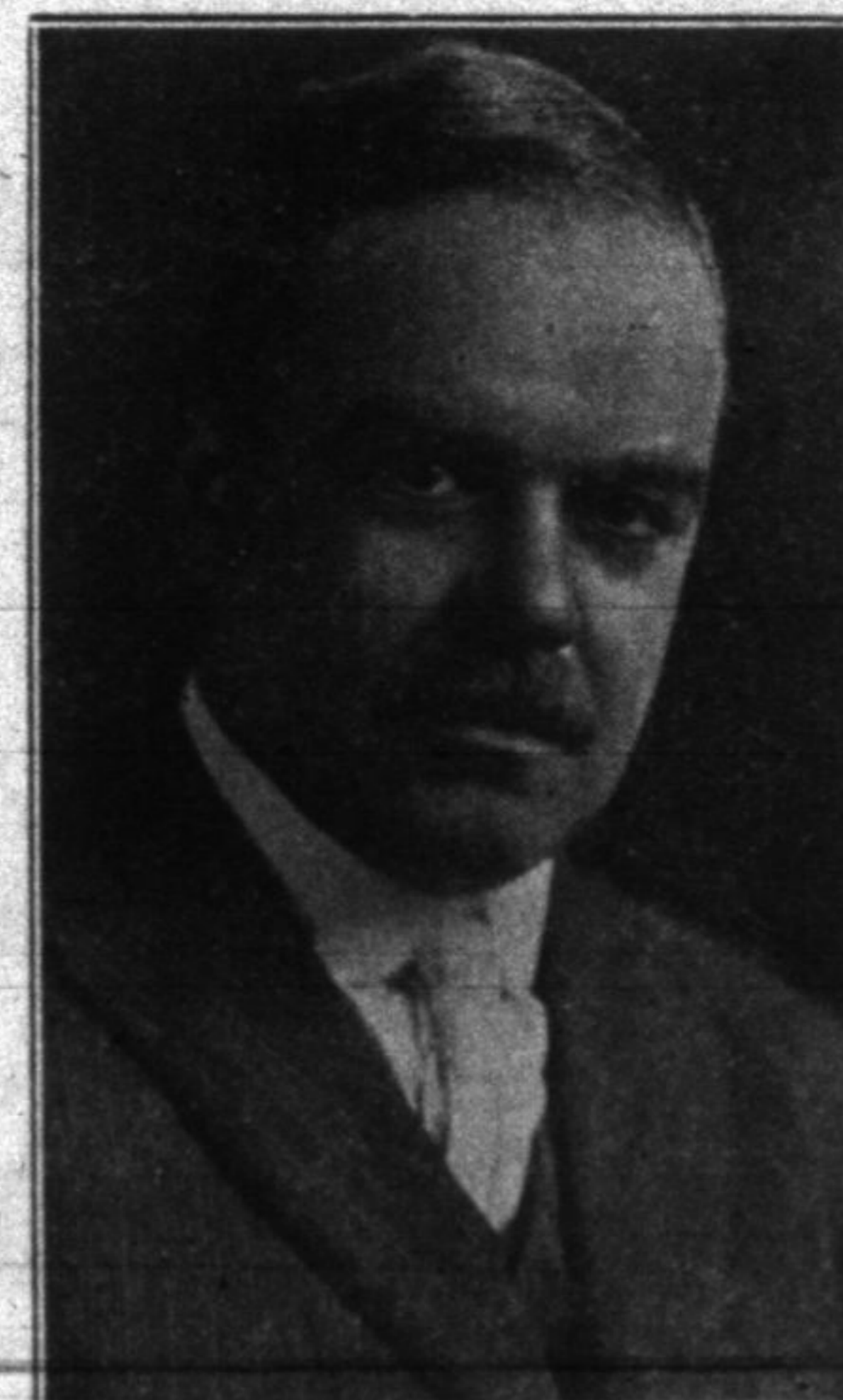
