**Expect Review of  
Remap Case During  
December Court Term**

Judge Edward D. Shurtleff, who ruled that the congressional reapportionment was unconstitutional, has expedited the case so that it can be reviewed by the Illinois Supreme Court during the December term.

The ruling on the reapportionment has upset the political plans of proposed candidates, especially in Lake county. Under the reapportionment bill passed by the state legislature last summer, the Chicago section of the Thirteenth Congressional district was cut off and the remainder, including Lake county, Evanston and New Trier township, was made into the Tenth district.

Congressman Carl Chindblom of the Thirteenth district, who formerly lived in Chicago, has moved to Evanston so that he can be a candidate for re-election. John Hesse, Democrat, who gave Chindblom a close race at the November election, has indicated that he would be a candidate if the reapportionment is held unconstitutional by the higher court. Hesse lives in Chicago.

Leaping from the automobile in which officers were taking him to the county jail to await indictment by the grand jury for burglary, Joseph Neimer of Antioch was fired at 12 times last week as he fled from the pursuing officers and was finally captured hiding in a cellar and was taken to the county jail. **"The Vinegar Tree"  
Not As Sour As Its  
Name May Signify**

"The Vinegar Tree," a gay comedy of medium height, has settled down at the Selwyn theatre, Chicago, for a limited engagement. It has all the ingredients that make for a grand evening in the theatre. Then, too, it has Mary Boland, who is giving one of the grandest performances of her illustrious career.

The rather acidic-sounding title, "Vinegar Tree," is more or less a symbol of the leading role as played by Miss Boland. It means a bright, soft, indefinite species of the well-known sumac, known to botanists and playwrights as the "staghorn sumac, or vinegar tree." It can be seen everywhere, particularly throughout New England, its rich, wine-red hue fairly overcoming the fall landscape with long bunches of velvety crimson berries and pastel foliage. Those who know about such things claim that this extraordinary plant is continually changing the growing plants of its neighboring and often hardier flowers. In human characteristics it would most certainly be described as erratic, scatter-brained, and utterly irresponsible.

Just how far this symbolism should be carried to clarify the title, "Vinegar Tree," hasn't been determined; but at any rate in Miss Boland's interpretation you get all the frivolity, color, and wild gaiety generally attributed to this member of the sumac family.

The bright thread of the story concerns the foibles and fancies of Miss Boland as the scatter-brained, adorably foolish wife, who imagines herself a martyr to love. She has carried an old romance with an artist to, great imaginative heights. That love and its mauve memory has meant her spiritual happiness, she believes, through her succeeding married years. The ensuing meeting with this old beau, with a sister, whom she hasn't seen in 15 years, and with her own love-bitten daughter returned from college, all takes place in a week-end on Long Island. The opportunities for gorgeous comedy scenes are many, and the distinguished cast has seized them admirably. In the supporting company are H. Reeves-Smith, Frederic Worlock, Helen Brooks, Jean Shelby and Alan Campbell.
