by Walter F. Dodd in the Ravinia Village House Monday evening, Nov. 22. Mr. Dodd spoke on County Government. He gave a talk chuck full of food for thought.

Government, like all other institutions, must keep step with the times, says Mr. Dodd, if we are to be governed efficiently and economically. Under present day conditions we have too many units of government. These smaller units, such as townships, were necessary in the past, but with better roads, faster transportation and communication, many of these smaller units should be abandoned or consoli-

In Illinois, for example, there is no single problem of county government because of the differences in population. Of the 102 counties in sium class, 7:30 p.m. Illinois, ten have less than 10,000 population each. Sixty-two of these counties have decreased in population since 1920. The increase in state's population since 1920 is attributable to eight counties-Cook, Lake, DuPage, Kane, Macon, Madison, Peoria and Winnebago. In these counties with small population even the county unit is too small to operate an effective government economically. In these instances, counties will probably be consolidated and many functions will be transferred to the state.

Semi-Annual Event

The tendency in counties of this size is to abandon or consolidate townships, transferring many present township functions to the county, and certain county functions to the state.
