Death Rate at Fort Is Low in Past Year

The rate of deaths among officers, nurses and enlisted men at Fort Sheridan during the past year was but one in every thousand, which is a low figure for mortality. Discharges for disability occurred for every twenty-eight out of a thousand. Alcoholism is one of the greatest mortality factors at the north shore cantonment.

Common colds registered at the Fort during the year numbered 202, there were two cases of influenza, three tuberculosis, four cases of mumps, one case of measles and one of pneumonia reported at the Fort this past year.
