A Christmas cantata, "The World's Redeemer," will be presented on the evening of December 20th by the choir of St. Paul's Evangelical church.

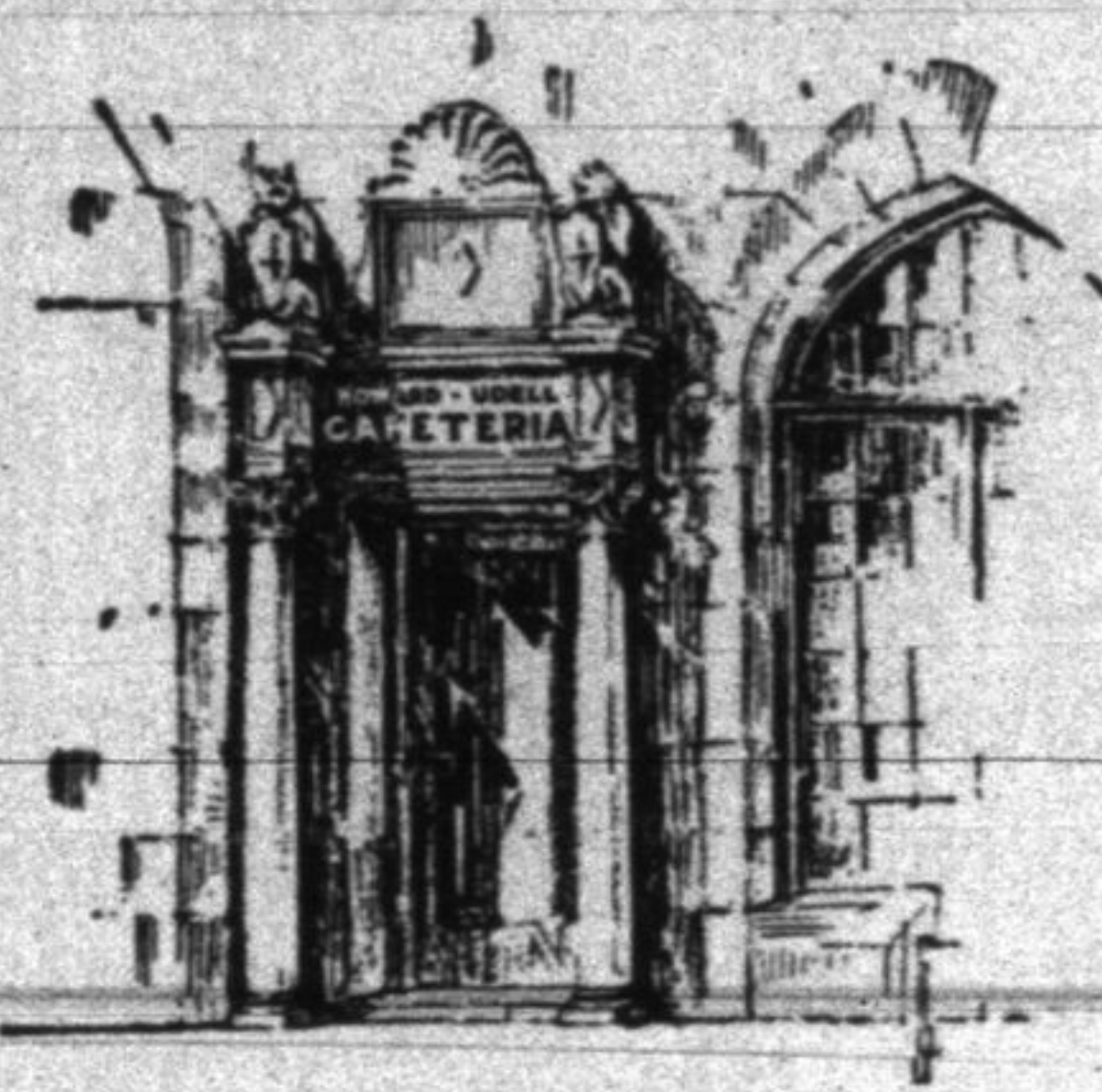
