

MOVE TO LIMIT PAUPER LEVIES

Amendment Offered in Legisla- ture to Govern Action of Town Boards

Measures providing for the limiting of levies for funds for pauper aid were introduced in the state senate and the house, by Senator Searle and Representative Carlson, last week. The bills will limit levies to 10 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation.

Action on these measures will not be taken until the regular session of the state legislature which opens in January but inasmuch as they have been introduced it is considered certain that town boards will be governed accordingly.

Representative Richard J. Lyons of Mundelein has filed a bill in the state legislature which provides for the removal of the requirement that city treasurers in cities under commission form must get 3 per cent interest on city funds. Mr. Lyons contends that the provision as to interest in the law cannot be carried out because most banks will not pay that much.

Two measures of importance be-

came laws through the attaching of the signatures of the governor today. The Bills are those introduced in the senate by Senator Bohrer which amend the revenues act of the state to provide for semi-annual payment of taxes changing the dates so that it will take effect on December 1, 1931, instead of the first of January, next.

Southern states—Arkansas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Dec. 17 to 20.

Eastern states—New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, New England states, Dec. 17 to 20.

Neighboring states — Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Dec. 19 to 21.

As there will be no mail delivery on Christmas day, shop early, wrap securely, address plainly.

Arrangements are complete to handle all mail promptly, no waiting, buy all your stamps which are to be used at Highland Park at this office, our service and expenditures are largely governed by the sale of stamps.
