Plane Makes Forced Landing Here in Fog

Lost in the heavy fog above Highland Park last Thursday for twenty minutes, and missing the Bob O'Link clubhouse water tower by less than three feet, Melvin Fried, pilot flying airmail from Chicago to St. Paul, Minn., was forced down in a hayfield west of Highland Park. Fried brought the plane down without damage after he had dumped more than 60 gallons of gasoline from his ship, but the condition of the soggy field prevented the takeoff of the plane after the fog had cleared.

A number of volunteer workers, assisted by several truckmen who attempted to roll the rough ground smooth so that the plane might have a runway, were aiding Fried to get his ship back into the air.

Mail from the grounded airplane was taken by motor truck to the Highland Park postoffice and was sent by train to its destination.

inating the house in color against a background of snow. These flood lights may be purchased cheaply in the electrical dealer stores, or made at home by fastening a weatherproof electric light socket in a tin coffee or lard can, and fusing a 100 or 150 watt lamp. The end of the can may be covered with colored gelatin, fastened on with a rubber band or a cord.

"Strings of colored lights are good on trees and shrubs, and along the outlines of the house. Lighted wreaths and five-pointed stars may be purchased or improvised for the doors and windows. Charming effects may be created by cutting Christmas scenes out of black pasteboard and using them as silhouettes in windows and in front of lights.

Free Display Suggestions

"These are only a few suggestions that entrants may use in decorating their homes for the contest," said Mr. Udell. "Without doubt there are many, many more ideas just as practical."

The contest committee has on hand a limited supply of free booklets containing numerous suggestions for outdoor Christmas displays. These may be obtained for the asking at the contest headquarters, at the Press office, or by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope to Mr. Udell, contest chairman.

Rules for entering your home in the contest are simple and easily followed:

Rules and Entrance Blank

1. All residences of municipality eligible to compete in contest.
2. Only displays on property within the municipal limits used for residential purposes shall be considered eligible for this contest. Each entry must be submitted in the name of a single individual; no combined displays shall be eligible for competition.
3. Displays must be installed and on exhibit from Dec. 20, 1931 to Jan. 1, 1932, inclusive.
4. Displays shall be judged by a competent committee of prominent citizens to be known as the Outdoor Christmas Display Contest committee.
5. The points that will be taken into account in judging the displays shall be artistic merit, simplicity, and night time effectiveness. Interior decorations visible from the exterior will be considered part of the display effect.
6. All entries, to be eligible for prizes, must mail name and address to the office of this newspaper in care of the Outdoor Christmas Display Contest committee on or before Dec. 20, 1931. Officials and employees of this newspaper are not eligible to compete.
