INSTRUCTOR ATTENDS PRESIDENT'S BETTER HOME CONFERENCE

Bringing back many new suggestions for the solution of the housing problem, Mr. Durbahn of the Deerfield-Shields high school returned last week from the Better Homes conference held at the White House December 1-5.

The meetings were held to discuss plans formulated by twenty-five committees organized in August 1930 for the purpose of gathering facts and information related to housing.

Mr. Durbahn attended the following meetings: Fundamental Equipment, Construction, Kitchen and Other Work Centers, Landscape Planning and Planting, Technological Development, Relationship of Income and the Home, and two general sessions.

"These reports," said Mr. Durbahn, will be carried to all parts of the United States and no doubt will create an interest in building, home ownership, more economical methods of construction, and more practical designs of homes.

"I have a number of press releases on the various meetings, together with the pamphlets issued by the committees, which will be available to any teacher or department. I shall be glad to meet with anyone for further explanation.

"These reports will be of special interest to home economics, art appreciation, and commercial teachers, as well as teachers in related building trades. They will also be available in the library for the use of the students."

May Start Another Drive Against Aliens

Possibility that immigration officials, who during the past year have caused the arrest and deportation of several Waukegan and North Chicago residents, may start another drive against aliens was seen last week when it became known that a Greek, Athanos Anastislazorov, 27, of 671 South Genesee street, was ordered held last night. Anastislazorov was taken to Chicago and was released under \$500 bonds to appear before immigration officials for questioning.

The arrest of the alleged alien was made by local police at the request of Immigration Officer D. J. Kelley of Chicago.

N. W. Railway Wage Cut May Result in Strike

The possibility of a strike by employees of the maintenance of way division of the Chicago and North Western railway is reported as the result of an announcement that these employees, numbering about 5,000, have been forced to take a pay cut of 5 cents an hour.

The cut was placed in effect Monday after officials of the railway company refused to arbitrate a reduction with union officials. The cut will affect track workers on the North Western lines passing through and west of Waukegan, it is understood.

Sen. Glenn Announces West Point Appointee

Senator Otis Glenn of Illinois announced today the nomination of W. Arthur Joyce, 4552 North Western avenue, Chicago, for the principal appointment to the U. S. Military academy at West Point, as a result of the competitive examination given at various post offices throughout the state on Oct. 31.

Another examination will be held

on Jan. 9, 1931, to fill an additional vacancy at West Point which will occur upon the graduation next June of Cadet Charles H. Anderson of Peoria, Senator Glenn stated.

As alternates, in case of the failure of Joyce, were named Robert L. Blohm of Beardstown, son of the American Consul at Degina, Saskatchewan, Canada, and Lewis T. Putman of Canton, son of Col. Floyd F. Putman, a veteran of the World

war. These three men topped the list of 148 candidates who took the examination, with respective ratings of 90.77, 90.38 and 90.17.

The two alternates, as well as the other 145 will have the privilege of taking the January examination if they desire to do so. The grades ranged from above 90 for the leaders to as low as 5.17, 2.67 and zero for the last three on the list. Only 16 had ratings above 80.



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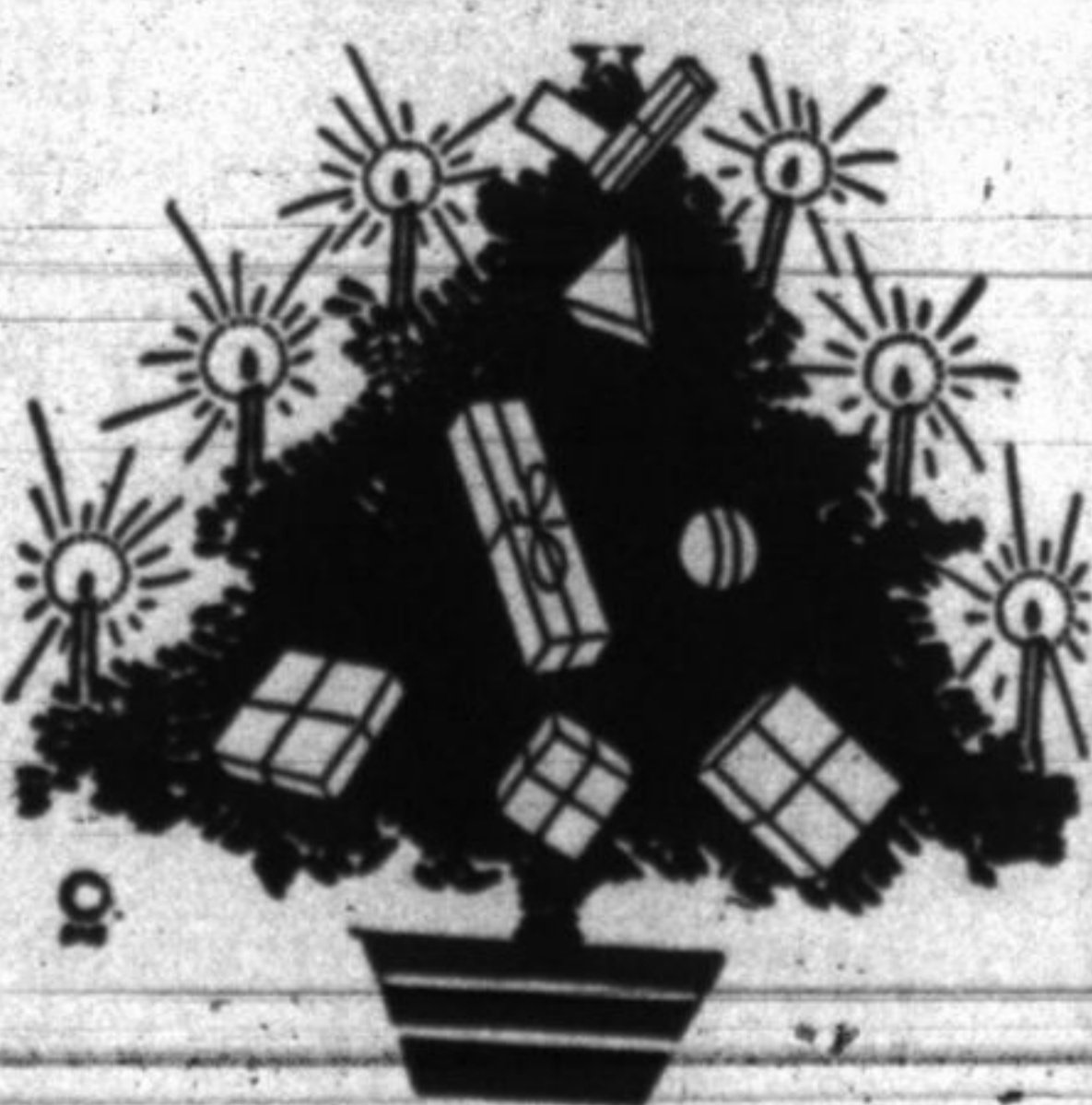
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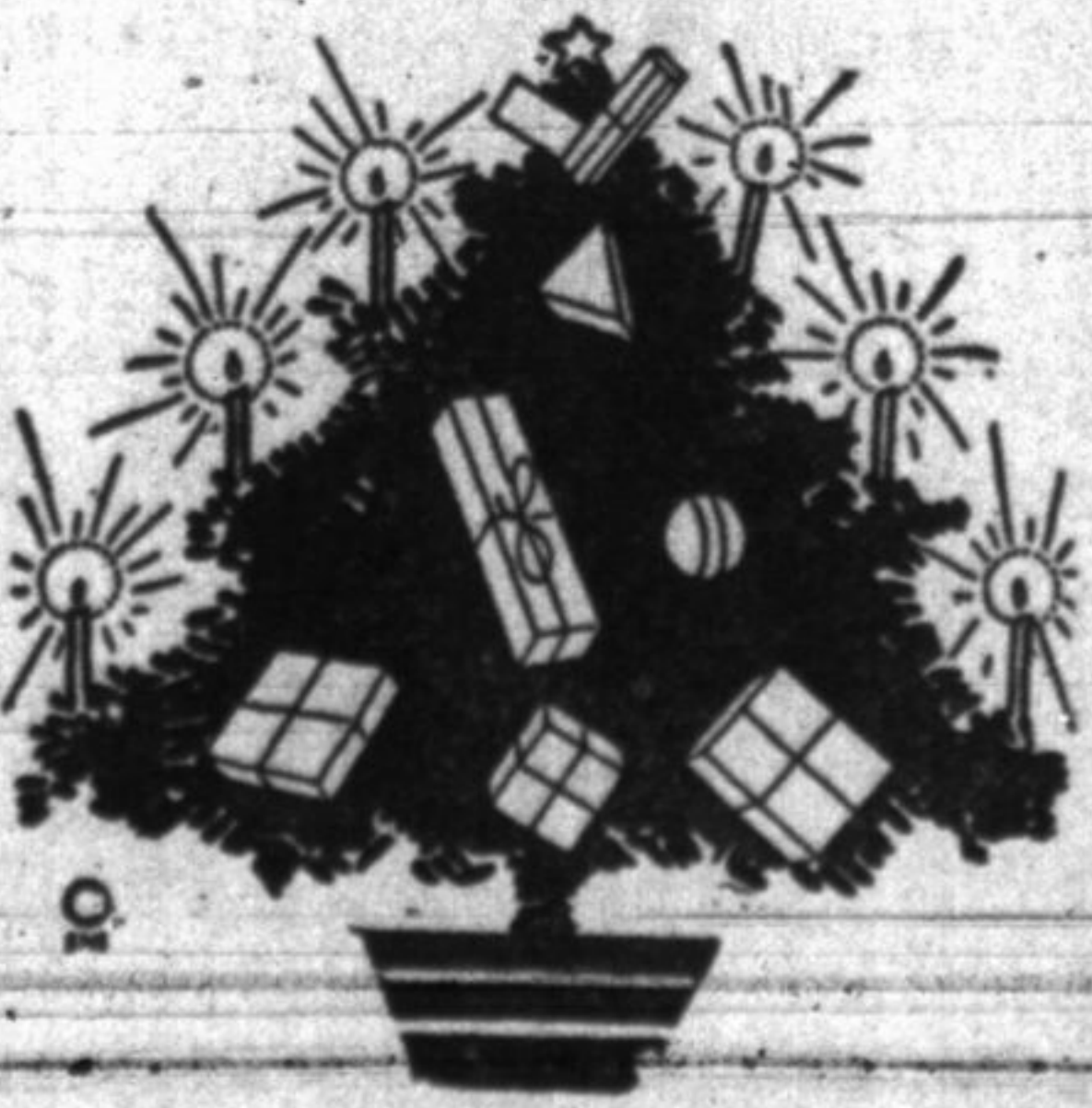
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
