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Taxpayers Association Opposed to School Law

The Central Lake County Taxpayers' association and groups of citizens in McHenry county are opposing to the new school tax law amendment proposed by Representative Richard J. Lyons.

Representative Thomas Bolger of McHenry has sided with the opposition to Lyons' amendment, which would decrease the general school tax limit from \$1.38 to \$1.25 on each \$100 valuation, but would allow an increase of 50 cents on the approval of a referendum asked by a school district, according to a Waukegan newspaper.

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
