Highways Const. Co. Believed Low Bidder on Sheridan Rd. Job

Bids for approximately 60 miles of state highway paving costing nearly \$1,750,000 Monday were received by the state department of public works and buildings at Springfield. Most of the work is scattered over northern Illinois. Bids are to be analyzed and the successful bidders notified as soon as possible. The only Lake county project provided for the paving of Sheridan road in Highland Park for a distance of 1.47 miles. The successful bidder appeared to be the Highways Construction company of Highland Park with a figure of \$73,777.25.

Flivver Plane to Be Demonstrated Soon At Sky Harbor Port

A "flivver" airplane weighing less than 500 pounds empty, powered with a new type of motor developed by the Herren Aeronautical corporation in Barrington, is to be brought to Sky Harbor airport west of Glen-coe for demonstration purposes soon, Maj. R. W. Schroeder, co-manager of the airport, said last week.

The new motor, with only four cylinders, is said to be the equivalent of an eight-cylinder motor. It was perfected by William R. Beckman, vice-president of the Herren company in charge of engineering. Claire Linsted, former navy flyer, designed the plane, and Major Schroeder of Sky Harbor supervised its construction.

The "Flivver" plane is a two place-tandem, open-biplane with a 24-foot wing spread and 19 feet 6 inches over all length. Its builders say it is stressed to perform all the man-uevers demanded of much heavier planes that are more than twice as expensive.
