

MEETING AT RAVINIA INTERESTING AFFAIR

Joint Gathering of Civic Assn. and Porcupines; Speakers Talk Zoning, Etc.

A general meeting of the Porcupines and the Ravinia Civic association was called Monday evening, Dec. 20, to discuss the Highland Park City Plan and Zoning. Alfred K. Stern, chairman of the Ravinia Civic association, was chairman of the meeting.

Leonard M. Rieser, chairman of the Highland Park Zoning committee and member of the Plan commission, told of the study which had been made of the proposed Highland Park City Plan and indicated specific areas which seemed logical for apartment developments. The problem of meeting the demand for apartments could be solved by having these areas adjoining the business district specifically designated for this class of structure. Mr. Rieser emphasized the fact that it is more objectionable to have apartments over stores, as is now possible under the present zoning, than it would be to have well-designed separate and attractive apartment buildings.

Crane Tells of Need

Mr. Jacob L. Crane, Jr., a member of the Highland Park Plan commission and designer of the City Plan, told of the need for a well-conceived city plan which would be upheld on the basis of its soundness and command the support of the community. He emphasized that zoning is an instrumentality to uphold such a plan but should not be looked to as a panacea. Mr. Crane pointed out that unless areas are designated for apartments, the courts might be powerless to permit a speculator-builder from forcing through an apartment development in an objectionable location and with an unattractive design. SEE NEW ROAD THRU FORT NEXT SPRING

Opening of Bids and Easement by War Dept. Promise Improvement

Opening of new bids recently at Springfield on the proposed changing and widening of Sheridan road through Fort Sheridan, together with the announcement from Washington that the War department had given the state an easement through the reservation for the new road has revived the hopes of motorists using Route 42 that this bad section of roadway will be replaced by a good 40-foot highway at least early next year.

It is also expected that McKinley road, where the section through Fort Sheridan joins it at the south end of Lake Forest, will be widened also as far north as Jones place, where the state route will swing back to the present Sheridan road, if the plans urged by Lake Forest city authorities are followed, as the city has been led to believe they will be.

New Road Route

The new road through the Fort will run from the southeast to the northwest, it was reported some time ago and will be about a mile or better in length. It will be 40-feet wide and paved with concrete.

When the first bids were carefully gone over by the State department of highways they were all rejected and new bids called for. The new bids were opened about a week ago, and it was then announced that the Highways Construction Co. of Highland Park was the apparent low bidder. Since that time no further information has been received from Springfield.

The new road through the Fort will connect with the south end of the brick-on-concrete roadway from Lake Forest known as McKinley road, and it is planned to widen this road also about three-quarters of its length between its south end and the Sacred Heart corner. The widened section will carry Sheridan road traffic as far north as Jones place, which is a short distance south of Sacred Heart crossing. At Jones place the highway will turn back to the present Route 42.

Will Divide Traffic

In this way traffic will be divided at the Jones place corner, so that the heavy commercial portion of it, it is expected, will continue north on McKinley, leaving Sheridan road for the use of pleasure cars and through traffic in a large measure. This plan also will eliminate the bridge on the present Sheridan road, just north of the Army reservation.

As the present road through Fort Sheridan is in very bad condition, motorists are hoping that some plan will be adopted to temporarily repair it for winter traffic, and they are looking forward anxiously to next spring for a beginning of operations on the proposed new road which is to be constructed by the state.
