Lyons in Article Analyzes the Work of Legislature

In answer to numerous queries regarding the number of types of legislative measures passed in the General Assembly during the last regular session, Representative Richard J. Lyons analyzes activities in an article appearing in a recent issue of the publication, "Real Estate."

Lyons' report reveals that 2,031 bills were introduced into the house and senate of which 492 were enacted into law. Forty-three of these were new laws.

Exactly 331 bills originated in the house of which 95 were appropriation measures, 196 amendments to existing laws, one a repeal act, ten validating acts, and 29 new laws.

In the senate there were 169 bills introduced of which 27 were measures for appropriation, 97 amendments to existing legislation, seven repeal acts, sixteen validating measures, and fourteen new laws.

Lyons has been asked permission to reprint the article for publication in the American Legislators Association, a magazine distributed to every legislator throughout the country.

In a second article, to be printed in the American Legislators Association, Representative Lyons tells of the various forces which influence legislation.

Sheriff's Deputies Corral Two Loads of Holiday Liquor

Two big loads of alcohol, intended for holiday distribution among the bootleggers and speakeasies of Lake county, were seized last week by Sheriff Lester Tiffany's deputies on county highways.

The alcohol found in the two automobiles apprehended has a com-

mercial value of \$845. This fixed for sale over the counters of speakeasies would net about \$5,000, it was estimated.

Arrest Chicagoans

Sheriff Tiffany's deputies were cruising the highways of the county when they spied large cans in the rear of automobiles driven by John Simons and John Gadeikis, both of Chicago.

Both cars had Illinois, 1931, licenses. The license on Gadeikis' car had been issued for another car. The motor vehicles had been traveling south, apparently from Wisconsin, when they were halted.

In Simon's automobile the deputies found 47 one-gallon and 20 five-gallon cans filled with alcohol. In the other car there were 22 gallon cans.

Held for Transportation

The two drivers were placed in the county jail on warrants issued by Justice Harry Hoyt, charging them with transporting liquor. The automobiles were confiscated and a checkup is being made by the sheriff's office on the automobile license found on Gadeikis' car.

Earlier in the week the sheriff's men halted a large shipment of Yuletide "booze" to the county. Ted Schuman of Morton Grove, driver of the automobile containing the liquor, was held in \$2,000 bond for a hearing.
