FIRST-AID DIRECTOR

Scoutmasters, assistant scoutmas-
ters, committeemen, commissioners,
Cub and Sea Scout leaders from the
eleven districts of the North Shore
Area council will meet at Elm Place
school (Highland Park) on the eve-
ning of Monday, Jan. 4 for a talk
and demonstration on First Aid to
be given by David F. Whitelaw, first
aid director of the North Shore line,
and faculty member of the North
Shore Area University of Scouting,
under whose auspices the meeting
is held. Mr. Whitelaw will be as-
sisted by a North Shore line first
aid drill team, comprising gradu-
ates of the company training course.

Mr. Whitelaw has been active in
the Boy Scouts first aid training
program for the past several years,
having served as instructor on the
University of Scouting faculty in
both the Chicago and Northwest
districts. He has arranged contests
for scout troops, supervised the
training of troop teams and person-
ally instructed the team that won
the championship in the Boy Scout
first aid contest held in Chicago in
1930.

Fourteen men and women em-
ployes of the North Shore line,
trained under his direction, are
now serving as first aid instructors
for boy and girl organizations in
north shore communities. These in-
structors are selected from the mem-
bership of an advanced first aid
class which meets weekly at the
Highwood offices of the company.

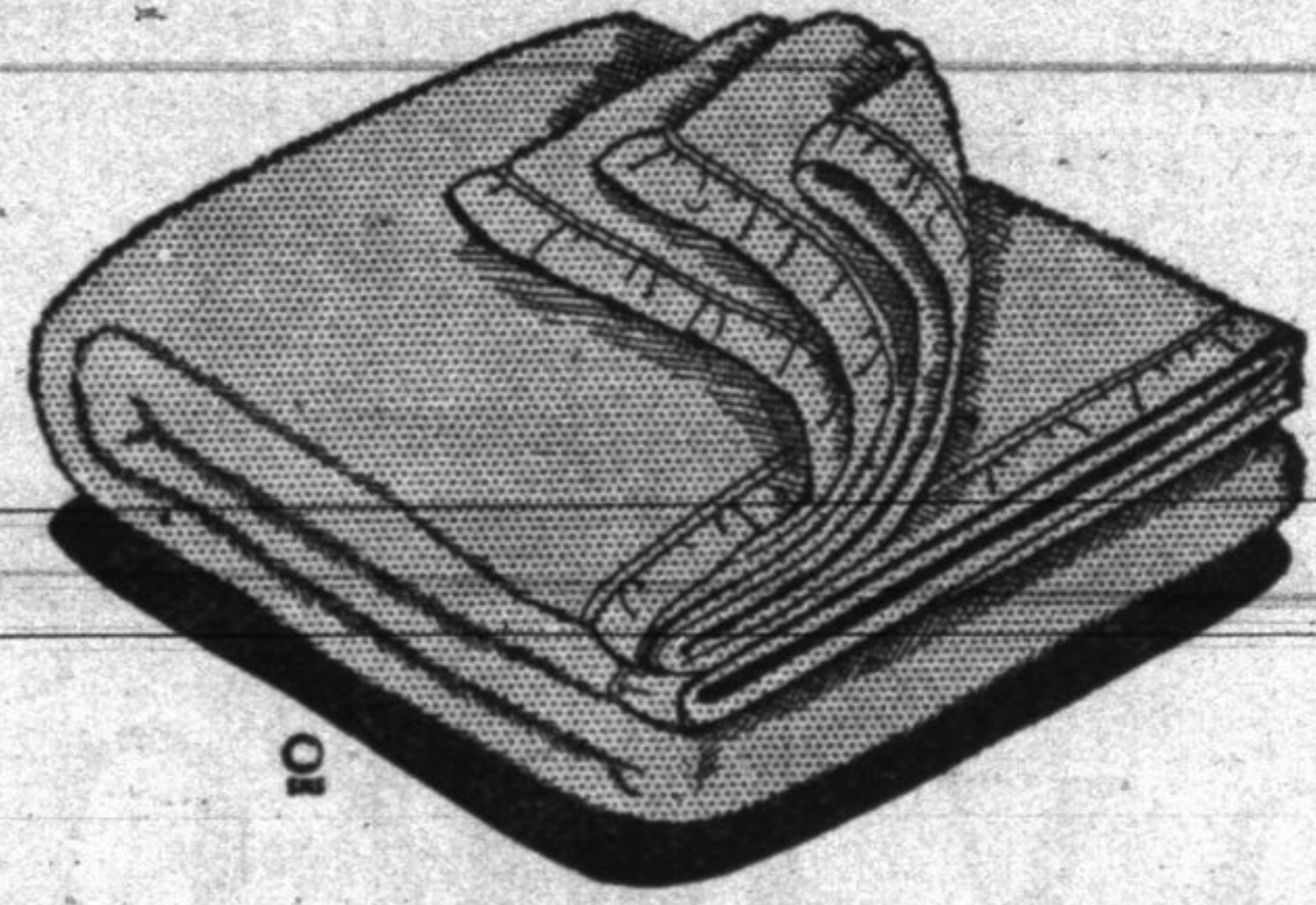
