JANUARY MEETING HIGH SCHOOL P.T.A.

To Be Held on 14th, at 7:30
P.M.; F. O. Holt Speaker;
Talking Movie Feature

The January meeting of the Deerfield-Shields P. T. A. will be held Thursday, Jan. 14, 1932, in the high school auditorium from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. Mr. F. O. Holt, registrar at the University of Wisconsin, chairman of the committee on co-operation between Wisconsin secondary schools and colleges, and former superintendent of schools at Janesville, Wis., will be the principal speaker of the evening. His subject will be "Who Should Go To College." Mr. H. D. Richardson, director of research at Deerfield-Shields has said of Mr. Holt: "Mr. Holt brings to his subject a wealth of experience as a superintendent of schools, registrar of the University of Wisconsin, and chairman of the committee on co-operation between Wisconsin secondary schools and colleges. This latter committee has conducted a cooperative testing program in practically every high school in Wisconsin, and now has available the results of a scholastic aptitude test which has been administered to 34,000 Wisconsin high school seniors. It is from a study of the results of these tests, and the related records of these students in college, and daily contact with the students themselves, and their problems, that Mr. Holt has become eminently competent to tell us who should go to college."

Talking Picture

Following fifteen minutes of music by the school orchestra under the direction of Mrs. Mannings, Mr. Kenneth Rouse of the University of Chicago will present a talkie movie concerning activities, buildings, and policies of the University of Chicago.

This "College Night" which is held once every two years for the benefit of junior and senior students and their parents, in the hopes that it will aid them in the selection of a suitable college. All students in the high school and their parents are cordially invited and urged to attend. The committee headed by Miss Bredin has been most fortunate in bringing to the school thirty representatives of all types of colleges and universities from all parts of our country.

These representatives will be at the high school in the afternoon from 3:30 p.m. until 5 o'clock. They will be in various classrooms in the East building for the purpose of conferring with the students. They are coming supplied with literature and some with small movie cameras. Important Meeting of Building Trades in Waukegan Thursday

Contractors and workers in the building trades throughout Lake county are especially interested in an open meeting of representatives of these groups to be held in the Waukegan high school auditorium on Thursday evening of this week, Jan. 7, to discuss existing conditions and a proposition to fix the wage scale at \$8 a day instead of \$14, according to Waukegan newspapers, as it is believed that such a move would tend greatly to increase building and improvements of this character generally throughout the county.

Oscar Rosenthal, prominent Chicago building authority, will be the principal authority and is expected to suggest a plan whereby much of the difficulties now besetting the building trades may be partially or wholly eliminated. All building trades workers and contractors in the county who are interested are invited to attend.

ANALYSIS OF SCHOOL BILL FAVORED HERE

Features of House Bill 72
which North Shore School
Districts Support

Strenuous efforts are being made by north shore and other school districts interested to have House Bill No. 72, which is expected here to relieve to some extent existing financial conditions in school districts, passed by the special session of the state legislature.

House Bill No. 72, which is the one the special committee headed by Mr. Howell Murray of Highland Park is supporting, carries the endorsement of the Illinois State School Board association, Illinois State Teachers' Association, City Superintendent's Association of Illinois, and the special committee of Cook, Du Page, and Lake county school boards. Other school boards scattered throughout the state also endorse this bill.

This bill has been carefully drawn by school board members elected in their several districts and charged with the proper conduct of public schools.

Analysis of Bill

The bill:

1. Does not raise taxes in any school district, except by a referendum of the voters of that particular district. In some districts taxes are reduced.
