In Effect Jan. 1

On Jan. 1 the new price of 12 cents for quarts and 7 cents for pints of milk went into effect in. all accredited dairies furnishing milk produced by the Waukegan local of the Pure Milk Association.

The new price per 100 pounds of milk to the producers is \$1.98 F.O.B. country. The old price was \$2.30 per 100 pounds The local dealers pay an additional 3 cents per hundred pounds for the milk delivered to their plants and it is then pasteurered to the consumers.

Dealers here point out that Waukegan consumers were given an additional benefit over the Chicago consumers in that price per pint is to be 7 cents, whereas, in Chicago it remains 8 cents, it was reported.


