She holds a professorship at the University of Chicago, is head resident of the university of Chicago Settlement, and chairman of the Committee on Women in Industry of the Illinois League of Women Voters.

Tuesday evening, 7:00 to 7:30 p.m. over WLS, the subject will be "1932 in Congress." Mrs. F. Louis Slade of New York City and a former officer of the National League of Women Voters, and Charles G. Ross, Washington correspondent of the St. Louis Post-Despatch, will be the speakers.

The issues before the 72nd congress will be discussed briefly by Mrs. Slade, while Mr. Ross will sum up the work Congress has already accomplished and describe its significance on the beginning of an election year.
