It is a moving story of mother love, wherein a vaudeville comedy queen fights for her daughters' happiness, by teaching them that love is greater than pretense. A pleasing comedy outstanding in its simplicity and relieved from banality by the excellent clowning of Edna May Oliver. The program begins at 1:15 and the league cordially invites all those who are interested to join with them in hearing Mrs. Tolles, who is a well informed and forceful speaker, discuss "The Geneva Conference and the Movement Toward Disarmament."

Believing that no single contribution to world peace can be compared in importance with the coming disarmament conference at Geneva, the League of Women Voters states that the seventh annual meeting of the Conference on the Cause and Cure of War comes at a most opportune time.

The conference, which is composed of 11 national women's organizations, will meet at the Hotel Washington, Washington, D. C., from Jan. 18 to 21. Mrs. Carr's Chapman Catt will preside at the sessions, and there will be numerous round tables and discussions led by experts.
