## FIRST ONE-ACT PLAY TOURNAMENT IN MARCH

### Sponsored by Community Rec- reation Bureau; Numerous Entries; Details

The first annual community One-Act Play tournament promises to be one of the most interesting community programs of the season. The tournament will continue two or three evenings, depending upon the final number of entries, and the time has been definitely set for the first week in March.

The auditorium in which the tournament will be held will be decided upon in the next week or two. Recent entries of dramatic groups include the Ravinia Players, the Fortnightly Drama club of the Presbyterian church, the Highland Community players, the Waukegan Community players, the Deerfield Dramatic league, and a group of players from the Deerfield-Shields high school. Any little theater group in Highland Park or nearby community is eligible to enter.

A silver loving cup with the name of the winning group engraved upon it will be presented at the close of the contest.

### No Entry Fee

There are no fees required for entry. A nominal admission will be charged to the tournament and after defraying all expenses of advertising, judges, and other costs incidental to the contest, the balance will be divided proportionately among the groups entered.

Plays should be presented that can be done effectively in drapes and set pieces. Scenery will be furnished for a simple interior and a simple exterior. Furniture, costumes, and

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## Chindblom in Notice of Revenue Hearings

A letter from Congressman Chindblom states that in contemplation of a revision of the revenue laws and the imposition of increased and additional taxes, the Committee on Ways and Means of the House of Representatives announces to all concerned that it will hold public hearings at Washington, D. C., beginning Wednesday, Jan. 13, at 10 o'clock a.m.

A tentative schedule of hearings has been arranged as follows:

- General statements, Jan. 13 and 14.
- Income-tax rates, Jan. 15 and 16.
- Income tax-General and Supplemental Provisions, Jan. 18 and 19.
- Estate and gift taxes, Jan. 20.
- Miscellaneous taxes, Jan. 21, 22, and 23.

Administrative and General provisions, Jan. 25.

Hearings will be conducted in the hearing room of the committee, room 321 House office building, Washington, D. C. Sessions will begin at 10 o'clock a. m. and 2 o'clock p.m. unless otherwise ordered by the committee.

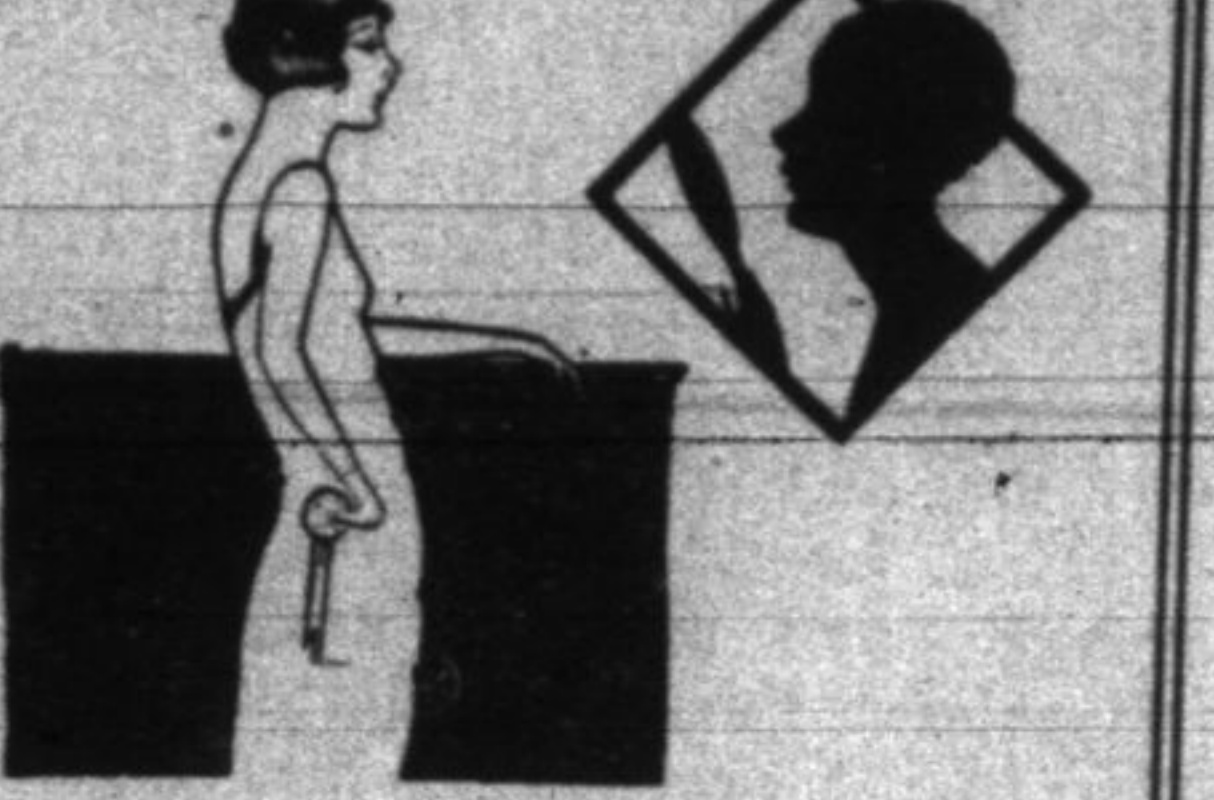
