

Mrs. Olga Lencioni's Funeral Held Monday; Death Occurred Friday

Mrs. Olga Lencioni, wife of Anthony Lencioni, died Friday last, at 7:40 o'clock, in the Highland Park hospital, following about ten days of illness of pneumonia, which started from a bad cold.

The funeral was held Monday at 10 o'clock at St. James church, Highwood, and burial was in All Saints cemetery, near DesPlaines. The funeral was very largely attended, and more than a thousand friends of the family called at the home, 138 S. Green Bay road, following Mrs. Lencioni's death, to express their sympathy. This indicates the high esteem in which the deceased lady was held in the community and the wide circle of friends the family has in the city.

Mrs. Lencioni was born in Chicago April 9, 1889, and came to Highland Park immediately following her marriage to Mr. Lencioni in 1907. Here both made a host of loyal friends by whom they have al-

ways been highly regarded, and Mrs. Lencioni's death was a source of great grief to them all. The family has the deep sympathy of the entire community at this time.

Besides the husband there survive two daughters, Mrs. Carl Risdon, Highland Park; Mrs. Mafalda Fesegallo, Philadelphia (who is here at present); and four sons, Paul, James, Edward and Daniel Lencioni.

Mrs. Lencioni's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kashmir Lazzoroni, are both dead, but several brothers and sisters live in Chicago, and one sister, Mrs. Jose Pacini is a resident of Antioch.

Primitive Writings

Found in Cavern at Grafton, Illinois

Writings, believed to have been inscribed centuries ago by primitive men, have been found on the walls of a cavern in a bluff in the vicinity of Grafton, Ill., and near the Mississippi river.

The strange writings, which appear to be of Greek origin, were found by George Brainerd, Jerseyville, who recently explored the cavern which had been considered an old den in the rocks, the possible lair of wild animals.

Specimens of the writing have been sent to Smithsonian institute and requests have been made to the University of Illinois to send an expert to read, if possible, the records on the cavern walls.
