

TAX RATES FOR 1932 ARE MOSTLY HIGHER

Three in Lake Forest Show Reductions; Highland Park Dist. Increased

Three districts in Lake Forest, one in Lake Villa and one in Barrington showed decreases in the 1931 tax rate for taxes payable in 1932, according to figures released this week by the county clerk's office. One district at Lake Zurich remained the same and all the other 30 city, town and village districts of the county showed increases, including those in Highland Park. Total tax rates for the various districts of the county, and comparisons with the rates of 1930 are given as follows:

Dr. Abram Sachar at Men's Club Meeting

"The Romance of the Rothschilds" will be the subject of Dr. Abram L. Sachar's lecture at the Men's Club meeting, Thursday evening, Jan. 21, at 8 p.m. Members, their wives, friends and neighbors, are invited to hear this lecture by Dr. Sachar.

The theme selected is an astounding saga of one of the most famous families in modern history. The lecture includes the squalid background out of which the founder of the world's greatest financial dynasty emerged, the rise of the Five Frankforters, the career of Lionel which culminates in the spectacular purchase of the Suez Canal, and the

present status of the dynasty. An important story related entertainingly and authoritatively.

Dr. Sachar was educated at the Washington and Harvard Universities, followed by three years of post graduate research at the University of Cambridge, England, where he received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy for his work upon the Victorian House of Lords. In 1923 he joined the faculty of the University of Illinois, instructing in the field of modern European and English history.
