Girl Scout Fashions

The fashionable uniform in Girl Scouting is the one which is correctly worn. However, far too many of us are extremely out-of-date, and there is no reason to be except, perhaps, carelessness or a lack of knowledge of what is "style" in this particular. The uniform dress responds especially well to washing and ironing, and this makes such a difference in a Girl Scout's appearance. No other belt except that of its own material or a green leather or web belt should be worn. And our ties! How we drape ourselves in them as if they were shawls. The tie is supposed to be folded as narrowly as possible, like a cravat bandage, and it does not show under the collar except for the embroidered trefoll at the back of the neck and at the four-in-hand or sailor knot in front. The Girl Scout pin belongs on that knot.

Necklaces and jewelry do not "go" with a uniform, any more than do high heeled slippers. "Bad taste" someone will be sure to murmur. The hat is really a part of the uniform and we hope that leaders will urge their girls to consider it as such.

Lastly — shoes and stockings. Shoes should be plain, low-heeled, and matching the stockings if possible. It has been decided that silk stockings may be worn, as well as wool or cotton. However, they must be dark brown, green, or black. A Girl Scout in "perfect" uniform is an attractive person, but an untidy, incomplete uniform is far worse than none at all. May there not be some New Year resolution on appearances.

TEN REASONS FOR JOINING LEGION

Cards Sent Out by Illinois Department List Them; Veterans, Attention!



A rather novel treatment of reasons for joining the American Legion is being used with much success by the Illinois department, according to word received at National Headquarters of Indianapolis. The reasons advanced by the department have been reproduced on cards comparable in size and quality to a government postal card. Frank E. Samuel, assistant national adjutant in charge of membership, believes the idea can be effectively used in encouraging eligible veterans to enroll in Legion ranks and he recommends it for the consideration of other departments and posts. The reasons are given below.

Ten Reasons for Joining

1. The blue and gold button of the American Legion testifies service for God and country in war, and service to community, state and nation in time of peace. (Peace-time service.)
2. You are making it possible to attain our objective of every disabled ex-service man and his dependents taken care of by our government. (Rehabilitation.)
3. By belonging you are helping to carry out the great Child Welfare program that the legion is sponsoring. (Child welfare.)
4. You are backing the greatest principles of Americanism by combating un-American principles, supporting patriotic education among the children and our citizens and making our communities among the children and our citizens and making our communities better places to live in. (Americanism.)
5. You will help teach sportsmanship and higher ideals to the youth of America through the Legion Junior baseball, Boy Scout and School Medal awards program. (Junior education.)
6. You will help in our great National Defense program for adequate national protection and thorough co-operation with the R.O.T.C. and C.M.T.C. programs. (National defense.)
7. Every piece of legislation beneficial to ex-service men has found the American Legion behind the wheel. (Legislation.)

The Legion On Parade

Through the co-operation of Sol Strauss, manager of Alcyon theatre, the Dumaresq Spencer and Deerfield posts of the American Legion presented "The Legion on Parade" at the evening performances at the Alcyon theatre Saturday evening, January 2. Charles C. Kapschull introduced the speaker of the evening, Russell C. Tomlinson, of Lake Forest College faculty, who talked on "The Purpose of the Legion."

Jerry Havelka, of Fox Lake, who won a national citation for his "one-man band" in the national convention parade, was introduced by Mr. Kapschull and gave a sample of his dexterity in playing four instruments at one and the same time.

"The Legion on Parade" depicted the national convention at Detroit, with all the thrilling scenes on a talking film. The famous vote on prohibition, election of Stevens as national commander, and President Hoover's reception and speech were shown as well as stirring portions of the big parade and other interesting sidelights.

One hundred patients from the two veterans hospitals, North Chicago and Great Lakes, were present as guests of the Legion posts and Mr. Strauss.

8. You become a member of the most democratic organization in the world. No rank in the Legion, no race, no creed. Honorable discharge and service during the World war, the only requirements. (Non-partisanship.)

9. You join-up with a real bunch of "he-men" who served side by side with you, through thick or thin; whether you were a millionaire or not, you were their buddy. (Comradeship.)

10. Individually you and I can do little; collectively in the 10,000 posts with over a million members we can accomplish anything that is worthy. (Organization.)
