

### Report Vercoe Plans to Retire From Board Next Spring; Veteran

Arthur W. Vercoe, Highland Park banker, and Charles E. Wilcox of Libertyville, are two of the old members of the board of supervisors who have indicated that they will not be up for re-election, it was learned last week, according to a Waukegan paper.

Vercoe is completing his eighteenth year as assistant supervisor from Deerfield township. For several terms he has been chairman of the finance committee of the board. Aside from that office he is at present a member of the road and bridge audit and resolutions committees.

"Supervisor Wilcox has been a member of the board since 1924, when he was named to fill the vacancy caused by the death of H. B.

Eger. The extra duties as poormaster since the transfer of pauper aid from the county to the townships, it was said, have been the cause of Wilcox's desire not to seek re-election.

"Some one else ought to have a chance," Wilcox said.

At the coming Libertyville township election, the voters will name a road commissioner—Irving Helfer's term expires—a school trustee and two members to the library board.
